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METHODOLOGY NOTE

This document, promoted and coordinated by the Sustainability Committee, is the second Sustainability Report published by Bocconi University. It continues the approach adopted last year, introducing several social and environmental sustainability initiatives as University policy and outlining the commitments to promoting more sustainable and responsible development models in advance of the orientations of the new Strategic Plan 2021-2025 and Bocconi Vision 2030 approved in November 2020.

From a methodological point of view, those initiatives are contained within the Bocconi University perimeter, thus all its teaching, research and operational areas, including the Bocconi Urban Campus. Data and information refer to the 2020 calendar year or, alternatively, when stated, the 2020-2021 academic year. Given the particular nature of the report period characterized as it was by the Covid-19 pandemic, 2020 data are not immediately comparable with those of previous years. In the cases specified assessments and considerations for contextualizing the data are reported.

With regard to the main methodological references, the University's main contributions to the achievement of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) of the United Nations 2030 Agenda have been reported for each of the major sustainability challenges identified, along with a set of KPIs able to provide an accurate and analytical vision of the University's commitment to these issues. In addition, the KPIs themselves are linked to the consolidated reporting practice of the Global Reporting Initiative (GRI) standards.

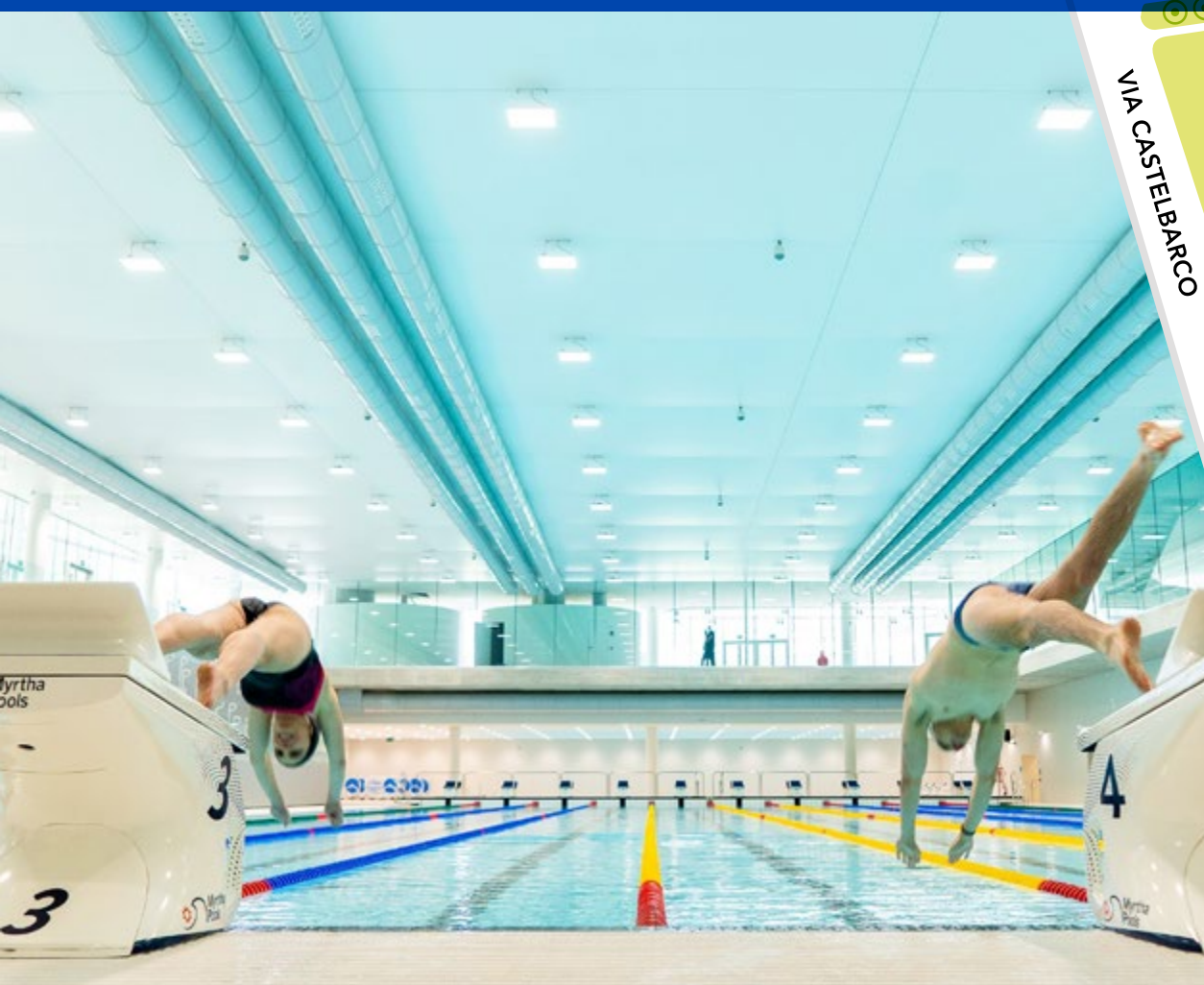
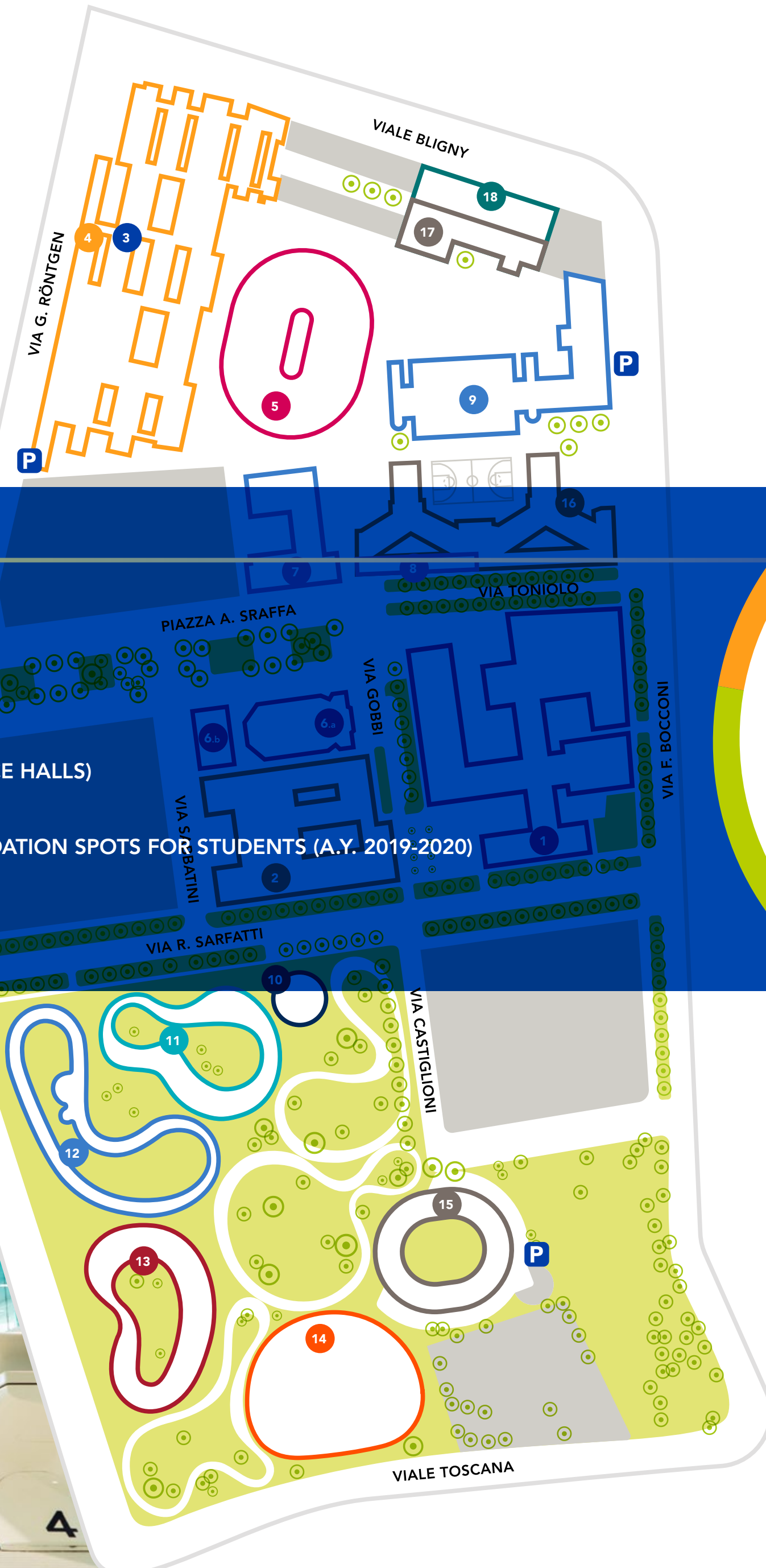

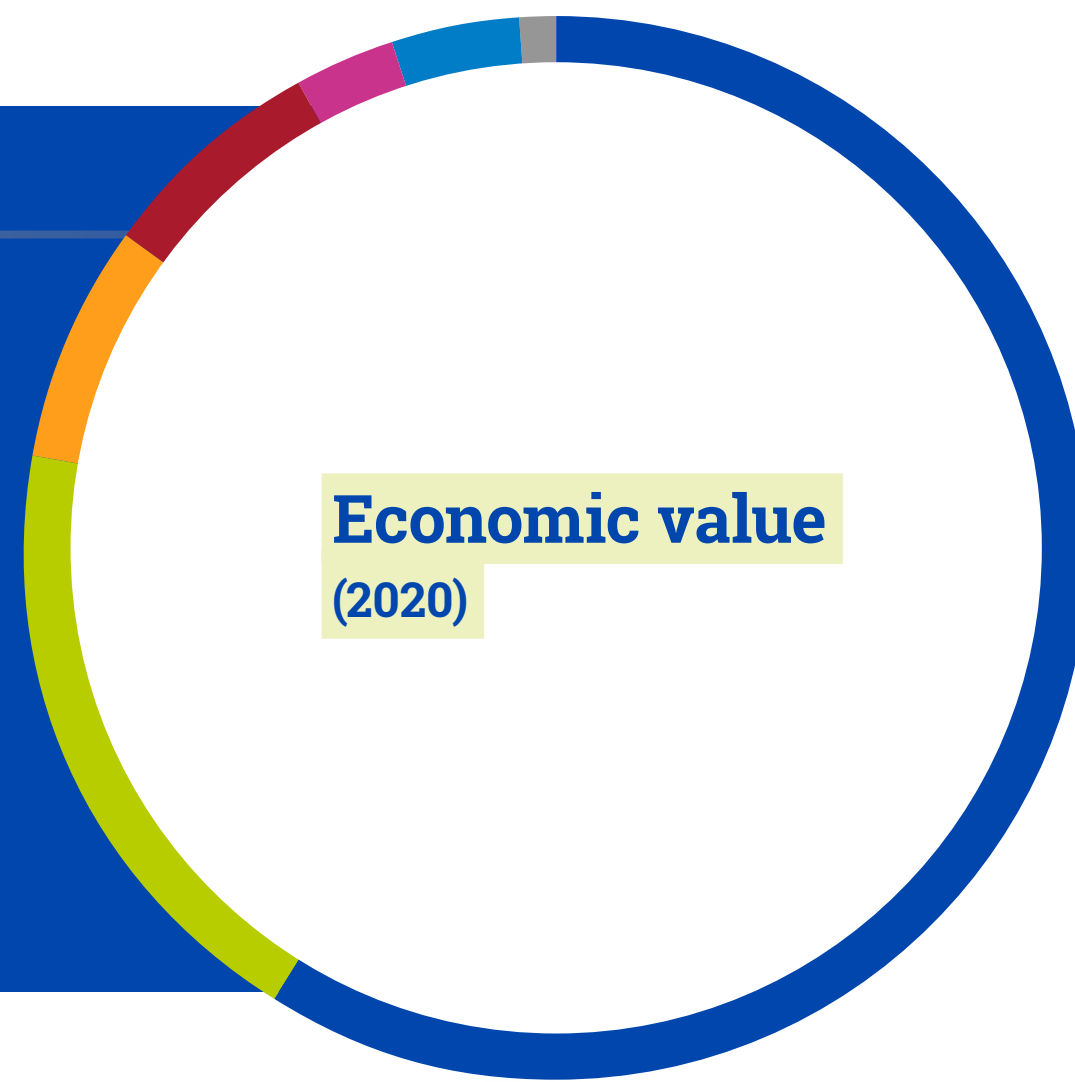

BOCCONI AND THE UN AGENDA 2030 FOR SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT

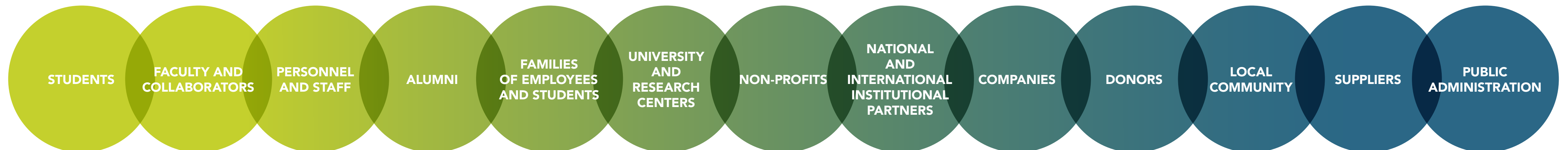
Once again, Bocconi's most direct contribution to the United Nations 2030 Agenda for sustainable development is in research and teaching, and in particular Quality Education (SDG 4), Gender Equality (SDG 5), Decent Work and Economic Growth (SDG 8), Reduced Inequalities (SDG 10), Sustainable Cities and Communities (SDG 11) and Climate Action (SDG 13).

Bocconi University also contributes to the development of multiple fields of study that address, in a multidisciplinary manner, many other SDGs. These include health and well-being (SDG 3) – as can be seen in the research on the health, economic and

social implications of the Covid-19 pandemic – as well as the fight against poverty and hunger around the world (SDG 1), access to and use of clean energy (SDG 7), sustainable innovation and infrastructure networks (SDG 9), the diffusion of more responsible production and consumption models (SDG 12), protection of the oceans (SDG 14), along with the conservation of natural resources and of life on earth (SDG 15) and the utilization of networks for specific projects that contribute to the pursuit of the 2030 Agenda's goals (SDG 17).

THE PERSPECTIVE OF OUR STAKEHOLDERS AND SUSTAINABILITY CHALLENGES

The formulation of our vision of sustainability, confirmed in Vision 2030 and the Strategic Plan 2021-2025, took into consideration the perspectives, needs and expectations of our stakeholders.



COVID: A YEAR OF INNOVATION



- ▶ All students involved in an internship, together with their respective hosts, are informed that the experience can continue in remote mode on a temporary basis.
- ▶ Adoption of extraordinary health and safety measures on campus
- ▶ Teaching moves entirely online in the space of a few days

- ▶ The Bocconi admissions test is offered online
- ▶ The 3rd installment of student accommodation fees is canceled (cancellation invoices amounting to €3.1m) and any installments already paid are refunded (€0.3m)

- ▶ Gradual resumption of SDA Bocconi activities on campus
- ▶ Students allowed to defer payment of the third installment of tuition and fees



- ▶ Bocconi hosts the Econometric Society conference, held online for the first time in its history, with an unprecedented number of participants from all over the world (about 4,500)

- ▶ Organization of the first PIM Annual Conference online (140 participants; 40 countries represented)

- ▶ Setting up of the Crisis Committee for monitoring the progress of the epidemic and assessing the impacts for Bocconi, especially regarding students abroad
- ▶ Dedicated support for students in China/Asia or who are about to leave for those parts of the world

- ▶ Exams and graduations are carried out solely online
- ▶ Start of monitoring and support activities for students who are abroad for study or internships through the creation of the "Students Abroad" team: approximately **1,000 students contacted** and, in the following 2 months, their return to Italy is monitored. This work is completed in mid-May, with the return of about 700 students
- ▶ Logistic support for more than **800 incoming exchange students** in the second semester. These activities continued until May, with 728 students returned to their countries and 242 students checked out early from residence halls (with shipment of luggage/effects left behind and return of library books)
- ▶ Fundraising for the Coronavirus Emergency Funds for the City of Milan and the Lombardy Region begins. It received contributions from over 1,000 donors (Alumni, Staff, Faculty, Students) for a total of €177,000. The University then donated €200,000

- ▶ Launch of **COVID CRISIS LAB** – Laboratory for Coronavirus Crisis Research



- ▶ Entrance and exit paths from classrooms are studied; organization of seating in classrooms at half capacity. Preparation of all internal and external signs, including totems and banners
- ▶ First edition of Bocconi&Jobs in online mode

- ▶ Agreement with Multimedia for molecular tests as part of occupational medicine services
- ▶ First edition of Virtual Investment Banking Week
- ▶ Publication of the first Sustainability Report
- ▶ Start of the "Now more than ever" campaign

- ▶ Bocconi obtains the prestigious **Biosafety Trust Certification** based on Rina Services standards
- ▶ Opening Ceremony of the Academic Year held online, with the participation of Ursula von der Leyen
- ▶ **Vision 2030** and **Strategic Plan 2025** documents are approved by the University Board

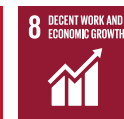

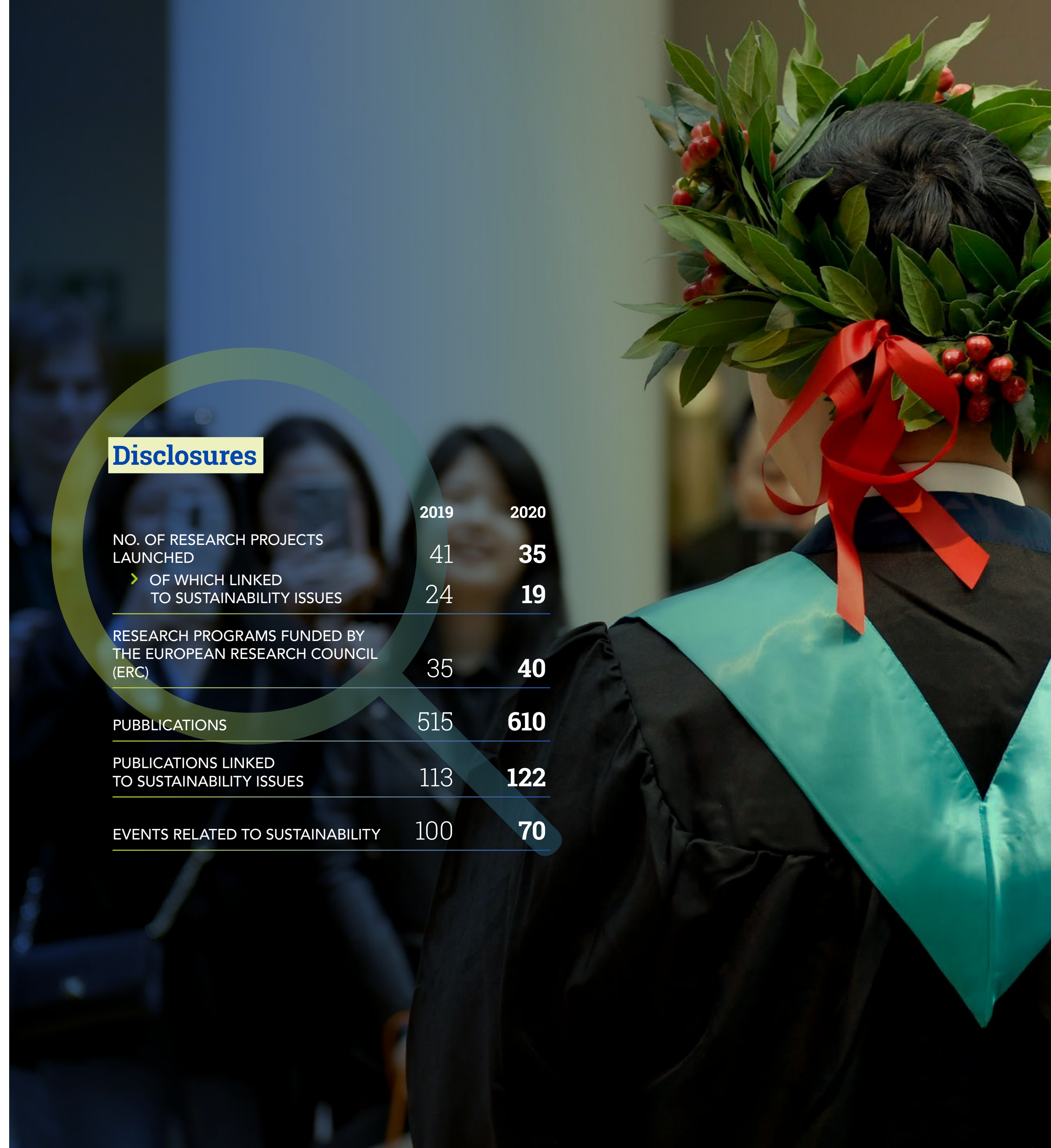

**COVID CRISIS LAB LABORATORY
FOR CORONAVIRUS CRISIS RESEARCH**



The Covid Crisis Lab's mission is to understand the spread of Covid-19 and analyze its numerous implications on the health of populations, healthcare, society, the economy at large and its financial and legal consequences. This is done by using rigorous evaluation methodologies across many disciplines.

The research aims to help analyze and plan efficient policies in response to the Covid-19 crisis. We disseminate our findings

and initiatives through several channels, including academic publications, the Lab's website, workshops and media releases.

In 2020 the COVID LAB actively contributed to the Italian and international public debates.

**SDA BOCCONI eSG LAB
EXCELLENCE IN SUSTAINABILITY
AND GOVERNANCE FOR SMEs**

The main aim of SDA Bocconi School of Management's eSG Lab is to produce and disseminate managerial skills regarding sustainability and governance of SMEs. In particular, eSG Lab focuses on developing an innovative strategic-organizational model to support decision-making processes in a context where sustainability and governance are increasingly important for the long-lasting success of companies, especially non-listed ones.



eSG Lab aims to involve SMEs, as they are the backbone of our economic-industrial system and an essential player in social and community dynamics. They are fundamental operators in value chains, both at national and international levels, contributing towards defining the overall sustainability profile of their production and supply chains.

**SDA BOCCONI SUSTAINABILITY LAB
BUSINESS FOR OCEAN SUSTAINABILITY**



The SDA Bocconi School of Management Sustainability Lab has long been working on analyzing the relations between the economy and the protection of the oceans. Thanks to several years of collaboration with the One Ocean Foundation, in partnership with other operators and international research centers, the Lab has developed relationships for research investigating direct and indirect pressures placed on marine ecosystems by human activities, in particular those of companies.

On 8 June 2020 the research report "**Business for Ocean Sustainability - A Global Perspective**" was presented at the United Nations annual World Oceans Day conference, dedicated to "Innovation for a Sustainable Ocean."

**GREEN
(HORIZON 2020 CORONADx)**

The GREEN Center has launched new research within the framework of the Horizon 2020 project CORONADx - Three Rapid Diagnostic tests (Point-of-Care) for Covid-19, aiming to improve preparedness for the epidemic and to provide public health and socio-economic benefits. GREEN will operate as a third party supporting the Università San Raffaele Vita-Salute. The project,

involving a consortium of eight international partners, aims to develop rapid SARS CoV-2 detection tools in order to support epidemiological, clinical and molecular studies.

**BOCCONI ETHICS COMMITTEE
FOR RESEARCH**

The Bocconi Ethics Committee for Research – instituted by Rectorial Decree in July 2013 – was created to ensure that research activity be conducted in accordance with fundamental ethical principles, including those contained in the "Charter of Fundamental Rights of the European Union." These principles include the need to guarantee freedom of research and to protect

the physical and moral integrity of persons and the wellbeing of animals. Ethics are fundamental for integrity, honesty and scientific clarity, and are deemed essential in research work by the European Commission and by the Research Executive Agency (REA).



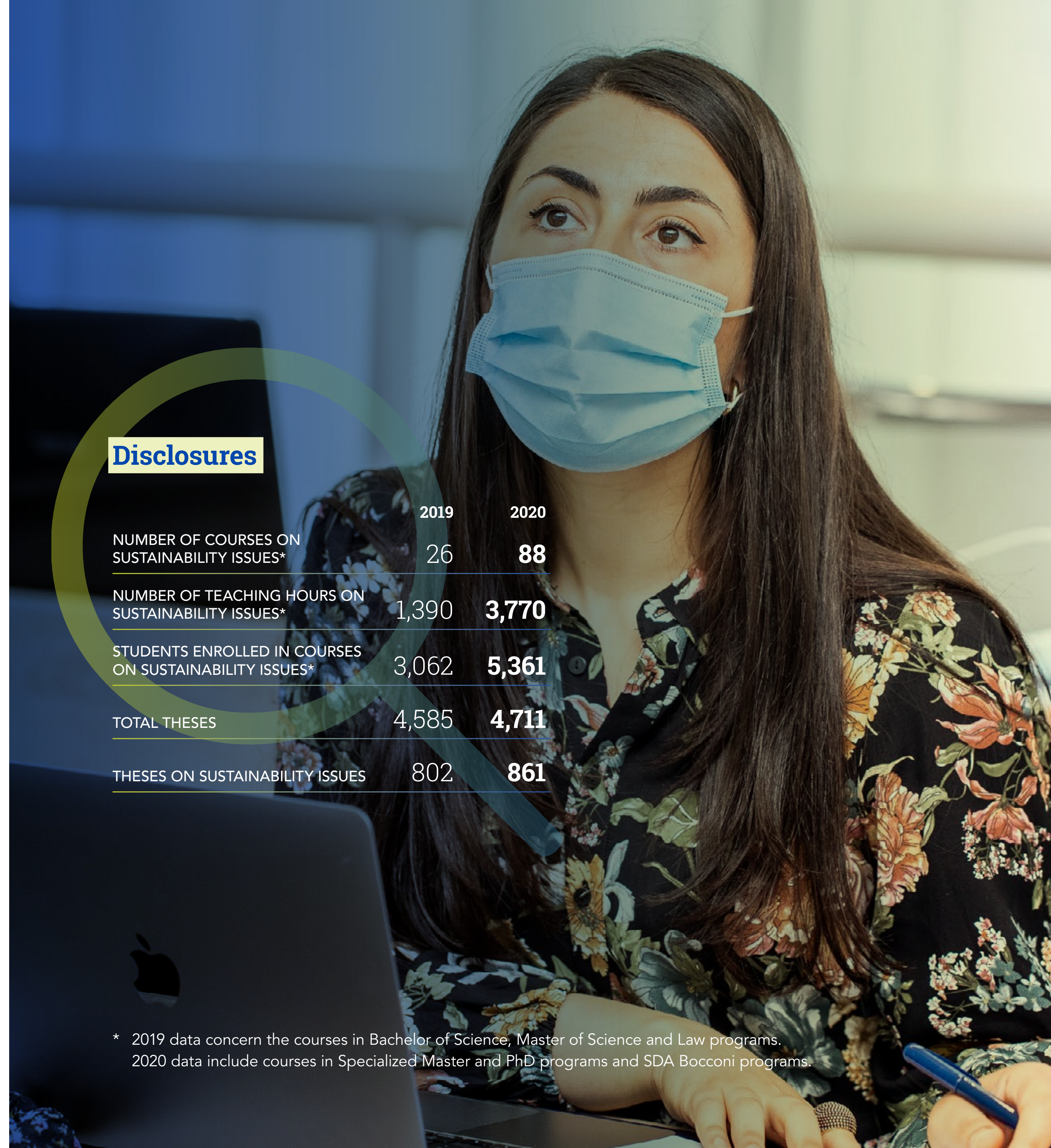
BEING A POINT OF REFERENCE ACROSS THE GLOBE IN TERMS OF EDUCATIONAL OFFER

A FEW INTERESTING INITIATIVES

SUSTAINABLE TECHNOLOGY FOR THE FUTURE OF EDUCATION



Even during the Covid-19 emergency, the University's activities never faltered, as the migration of in-person teaching to remote mode was immediate. With the evolution of the pandemic, and the gradual resumption of activities on campus, in-person lessons have continued to be accompanied by remote teaching, often in hybrid mode involving both methods. This has allowed us to accumulate considerable experience in the use of digital technologies, which represent an essential element of future educational and organizational planning.

Bocconi is experimenting with new ways of learning and developing knowledge, in which campus life remains central, but technology plays a role in the service of learning, in increasingly safe and sustainable ways.

MASEM - MASTER IN SUSTAINABILITY AND ENERGY MANAGEMENT

Bocconi was one of the first universities in the world to dedicate a specialized program to sustainability, corporate social and environmental responsibility, climate change, renewable energy, energy efficiency and sustainable urban development. The MaSEM program is rooted in this tradition and inherits the experience of the previous Master in Green Management, Energy and Corporate Social Responsibility (MaGER).

The results achieved over

the years with MaGER, together with MaSEM's innovative content, guarantee a well-rounded, solid preparation aimed at building cutting-edge knowledge and skills that can easily be used on the job market.

The MaSEM program, taught entirely in English, includes 500 hours of teaching, and a 400+-hour internship with leading organizations in energy and sustainability, supplemented by workshops, seminars and company presentations.

“In the past Bocconi University was very much focused on Italian students and professors, while in recent years it has radically changed its profile, increasing its international mindset and opening up to new points of view on campus. This made it necessary to consider the new needs which were introduced with these changes, such as the integration of international students and faculty. But the issue of diversity and inclusion goes much further. Indeed, it is not only a matter of nationality, but also of gender, ethnic background, religion and sexual orientation. It is also essential to make the campus more accessible to people with disabilities. Bocconi has addressed these

issues over the years by establishing Equal Opportunities Committee, and with the creation of the role of Dean for Diversity and Inclusion, these activities now have a single point of reference and a figure responsible for their coordination. When I am asked, “Why are diversity and inclusion so important?”, from a philosophical point of view, I say that we know that organizations should try to reduce inequality, especially systemic inequality. From a practical point of view, research tells us that diverse teams tend to work better and innovate more.

AN INCREASE IN THE NUMBER OF SCHOLARSHIPS

To address the challenge of social mobility, for many years Bocconi has pursued an increase in overall financial aid and scholarships for deserving students. One of the goals of the Strategic Plan 2025 is to increase the amount from the current €30m to €45m.

Special action will be taken to reach talented students from more disadvantaged backgrounds and students whose families have been particularly affected by the economic repercussions of the Covid-19 pandemic, allowing them to benefit from the best quality higher education.

 A FEW INTERESTING INITIATIVES

B-ABLE, DIVERSITY MANAGEMENT



After gathering the observations produced by a study on campus accessibility, the “B-able” project was presented to the Disabilities Committee in October 2020.

The study examined the issue of accessibility throughout the University campus and assessed both circulation and links between buildings and between buildings and outdoor and indoor public spaces, proposing guidelines for work to be done inside buildings to allow greater accessibility. A number of parameters

and indicators were drawn up, mapping out and identifying the main problems of accessibility and use on campus, thus developing a general summary framework.

More generally, Bocconi has long established a policy to guarantee the rights of differently-abled students and the Delegate Rector for Disability, Prof. Elio Borgonovi, is in charge to monitor the effective achievement of the objective of ensuring the right to university education and integration

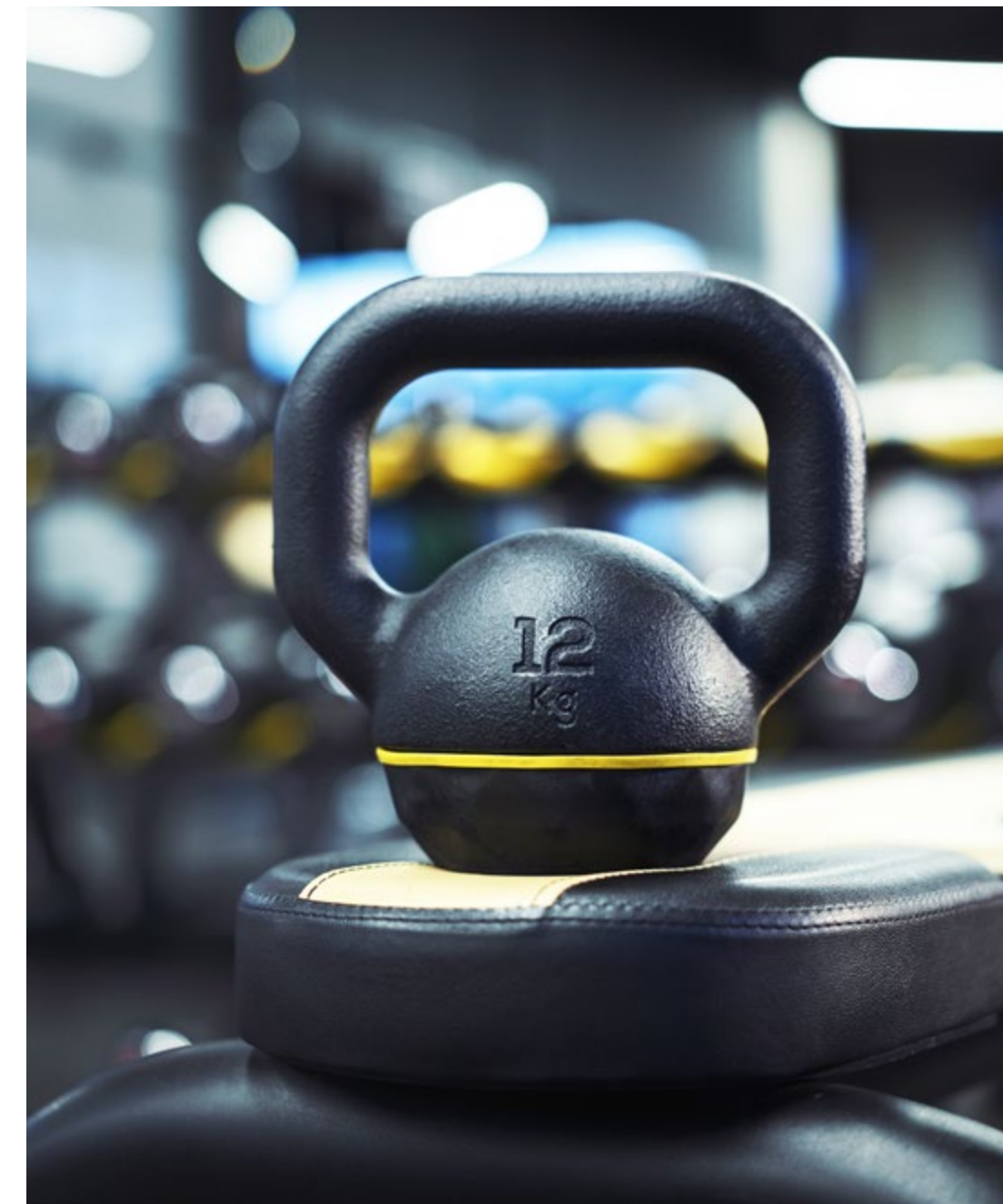
within the University, and to assess the efficiency and effectiveness of the services put in place by the University for that purpose. The Delegate adopts and supports initiatives aimed at integrating differently-abled students, and promotes all activities that may assist in this, both within and outside the University.

AXA RESEARCH LAB ON GENDER EQUALITY

L'AXA Research Lab on Gender Equality, diretto dalla Prof. Paola Profeta, promuove la ricerca nelle scienze sociali legate al genere. SPORT DONATION TO THE OPERA PRISON

During the decommissioning of the Bocconi gym, which occurred when the new Sport Center was being built, the University donated the existing equipment to the Opera Prison. The initiative was inspired by a letter from some inmates who had heard that Bocconi University was renovating its student gym and was looking to donate the equipment, all in excellent condition.



AN IT CLASSROOM FOR ST. MARY'S MIDWIFERY SCHOOL (UGANDA)



In 2020 the University – together with the Ambrosoli Foundation – donated some recently decommissioned teaching and IT infrastructure material to a school in Kenya. The classroom fitted out at St. Mary's School, linked to the Hospital in Kalongo (Uganda), will be used to train young African women who want to pursue specialized studies in nursing and midwifery at the school supported by the Ambrosoli Foundation.

In a country where many women and children die in childbirth and a region where this hospital is the only one in a radius of hundreds of kilometers, the donation's “leverage effect” goes well beyond its material or symbolic value.



GROWING THE BOCCONI URBAN CAMPUS EXPERIENCE

2020 was also a special year for the Bocconi campus, normally the scene of numerous cultural, sports and social events that are occasions for students, faculty and staff at the university to socialize and interact with each other. Several initiatives were quickly adopted to ensure the utmost safety of the entire Bocconi community, while activities were rescheduled, often online, in accordance with national and local legislation and common sense rules. The interest in Campus Life activities and the large number of on site and online events organized in 2020, while lower than in the previous year, testify to the community's desire to take part in University life.

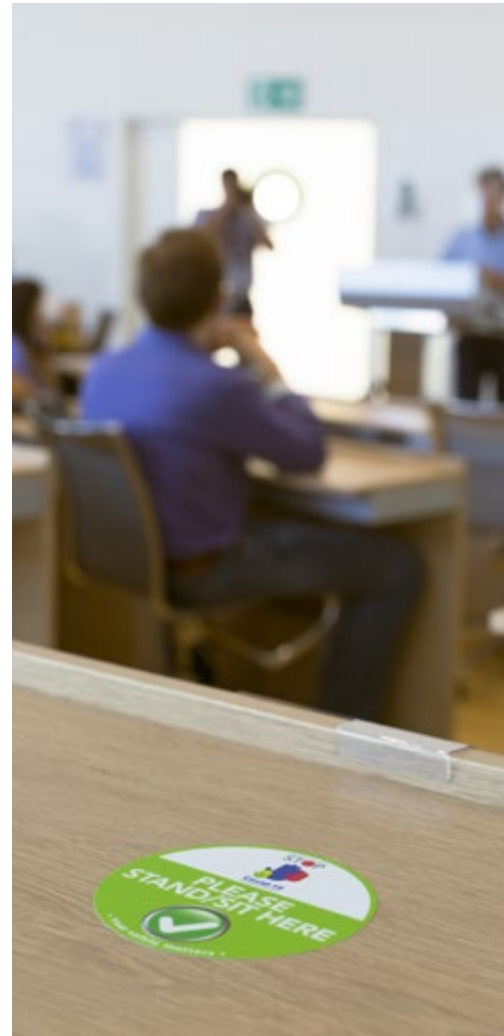

ON CAMPUS SECURITY



In February 2020 the company Control Risks carried out a security audit on the campus to evaluate existing measures, identifying several areas for improvement:

- creation of a central Control Room;
- use of a campus security service operating to deter and prevent problem situations;
- start of a technological update plan for existing infrastructures and systems (video-surveillance, intrusion alarms, fire alarms);
- design of a Security Plan to define security procedures and emergency response plans;
- design of a specific Security awareness program for the entire community.

BIOSAFETY TRUST CERTIFICATION

BIOSAFETY TRUST CERTIFICATION IS AMONG THE SHORT-LIST FINALISTS FOR THE “RISK RESILIENCE INITIATIVE OF THE YEAR” OF THE EUROPEAN RISK MANAGEMENT AWARD.



In November 2020 we obtained the Biosafety Trust Certification. It is the first certification scheme created to provide a set of best practices to help minimize the risk of spreading epidemics in public and private gathering places. Our University successfully completed the process that verifies compliance with the system of requirements put in place by the certifying body RINA.

SMOKE FREE CAMPUS

On 11/19/2020 the Municipality of Milan approved the “Air Quality Regulations” stating priorities and deadlines for a number of actions aimed at improving environmental quality in the city. In particular, starting on 1st January 2021 smoking outdoors is banned except in isolated areas, and it will also be banned within 10 meters of other persons.

- A number of actions have been launched on the Bocconi Campus:
- signage and posters;
 - 5 outdoor “Smoke Areas” identified and set up;
 - enforcement of the ban on smoking with a supervision service and itinerant checking.



INITIATIVES FOR SUSTAINABLE MOBILITY



In 2020 areas were prepared for the secure parking of bicycles, to encourage a more sustainable mobility among the Bocconi community. In June 2021 there were nearly 400 bike parking spots on campus.

FOOD & HEALTHY LIFESTYLE

VENDING MACHINE: older vending machines, with high energy consumption, were replaced with new low consumption models.

DISPOSABLE PLASTIC: the process of eliminating disposable plastic materials and products continues both with vending machines and at catering points.

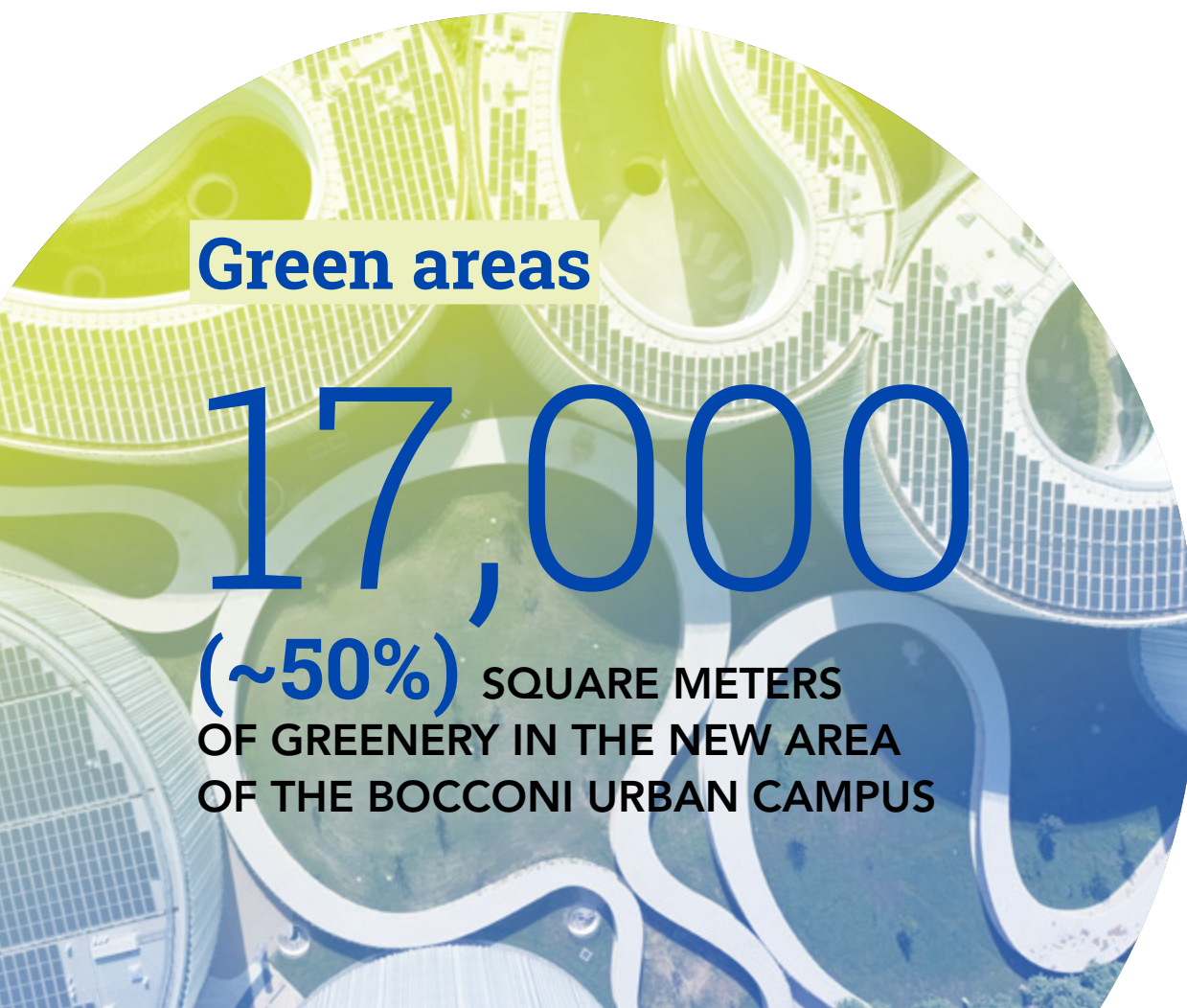
JUNK FOOD: an ongoing project to eliminate the presence of “junk food” in favor of healthy products.

SUSTAINABLE PRODUCTS: to pursue the 2025 strategic objectives, a project is being examined to offer food products that allow multicultural and religious inclusion, and to be mindful regarding both environmental sustainability and the exploitation of producers.



PROMOTING A CULTURE OF ENVIRONMENTAL RESPONSIBILITY AND MANAGING DIRECT ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACTS

2020 was an unusual year also in terms of environmental aspects and the management of the Bocconi campus's direct environmental impact. The main disclosures were not comparable with those of previous years owing to the smaller presence of students, faculty and staff both in the University itself and in residence halls. Overall, Bocconi continued developing initiatives aimed at fostering a culture of environmental responsibility, reducing its impact through continuous efficiency improvement and the scheduled commissioning of additional electricity generation systems using renewable photovoltaic sources.



* The emission factor 1.885 kgCO₂e/m³ was used to calculate Scope 1 emissions (Source: GHG Protocol tool for stationary combustion. Version 4.1). To calculate Scope 2, since January 2017 Bocconi has used electricity purchased from the 100% certified renewable grid, which means that Scope 2 emissions amount to zero, as do emissions determined by the use of geothermal energy.

** The 2020 figure, in contrast to the previous year, concerns "one-off" disposal operations of non-hazardous end-of-life equipment related to the planned modernization work on some Bocconi offices.

SUSTAINABILITY COMMITTEE

The Committee – established in 2013 – is responsible for determining the University’s guidelines and orientations for reducing environmental impact, fostering a culture of social responsibility and coordinating University projects on the basis of sustainability goals.

The Committee represent the promotor of the sustainability at Bocconi, in its various dimensions, both environmental and social.



ISO 50001

January 2021: renewal of ISO 50001 Certification confirming the energy management improvement process in all Bocconi facilities.

In addition to guaranteeing lower energy costs, ISO 50001 Certification has several advantages:

- it is valid support of the organization and optimization of energy consumption;
- it identifies best practices in energy management;
- it is an instrument for improving energy management to reduce CO₂ emissions.

LEED PLATINUM CERTIFICATION

Confirming the results in the sustainability process initiated by Bocconi University, the new Urban Campus has achieved LEED Platinum certification (which covers the entire life cycle of the building, from design to construction) for the new SDA Bocconi headquarters.

B4i BOCCONI FOR INNOVATION

ENDELEA



Endelea is a brand founded in Milan in 2018 with the idea of creating accessory and clothing collections in African wax fabrics with a made in Italy design. Having entered the acceleration program of B4i, Endelea (which in Swahili means “go ahead, continue without giving up”) aims to combine entrepreneurship, Italian design, social entrepreneurship and ethical fashion. Endelea’s collections are designed in Milan and handmade in Dar es Salaam, Tanzania, with fabrics purchased in local markets, and are designed to last a long time, with the aim of merging creativity, people and the environment. Endelea reinvests part of its revenues in on-site training activities and in the sponsorship of collaborations between Italian and Tanzanian universities. Thanks to the B4i acceleration program, Endelea has become a benefit corporation.

QUICK ALGORITHM



Quick Algorithm is a young deep-tech startup that aims to spread advanced analysis and artificial intelligence in the industrial sector. After entering the B4i acceleration program, Quick Algorithm has developed Scops, a SaaS (Service as a Service) platform that helps firms increase their productivity and reduce waste by collecting, sharing and analyzing data on their physical assets and company processes. In the manufacturing sector, 15% -40% of production costs come from maintenance and training. These costs could be greatly reduced if companies were able to free up information from advanced analytics.

B4i - Sustainability

B4i - Bocconi for Innovation is a Bocconi University initiative that acts as a catalyst for the most innovative and high potential ideas and startups in the Italian entrepreneurial ecosystem. Building on the unique experience, knowhow and legacy of our business school, B4i aims to promote entrepreneurial culture, encouraging and supporting innovative startups and developing innovation within companies.

Startups for the acceleration track are selected on the basis of the innovativeness of the business idea, the quality of the team of founders, the ability to respond to market demand and pertinence to the B4i’s three areas of specialization, namely: Digital Tech, Sustainability and Made in Italy.

With the specialization in Sustainability, B4i’s contribution extends to projects that address climate change, social entrepreneurship, the circular economy, smart communities and smart cities, and clean technology.



FOSTERING INTEGRATION INTO THE LOCAL COMMUNITY

Despite its strong international orientation, Bocconi has always cultivated its connection with its host community. Above all, the new Bocconi Urban Campus, designed to provide students, faculty and staff with a comfortable, innovative, safe and sustainable environment, is also shared with local residents and, in a broader sense, Milan. In 2020 work continued on the sports and recreation center, in particular the two 50-meter and 25-meter swimming pools, now permanently operational for all Milan's residents to enjoy.

COVID DONATION



In March 2020 Bocconi began fundraising for the Coronavirus Emergency Funds for the City of Milan and the Lombardy Region. The University then donated an additional **€ 200,000**, for a total amount of nearly **€ 400,000**.

CSR AND SOCIAL INNOVATION FAIR

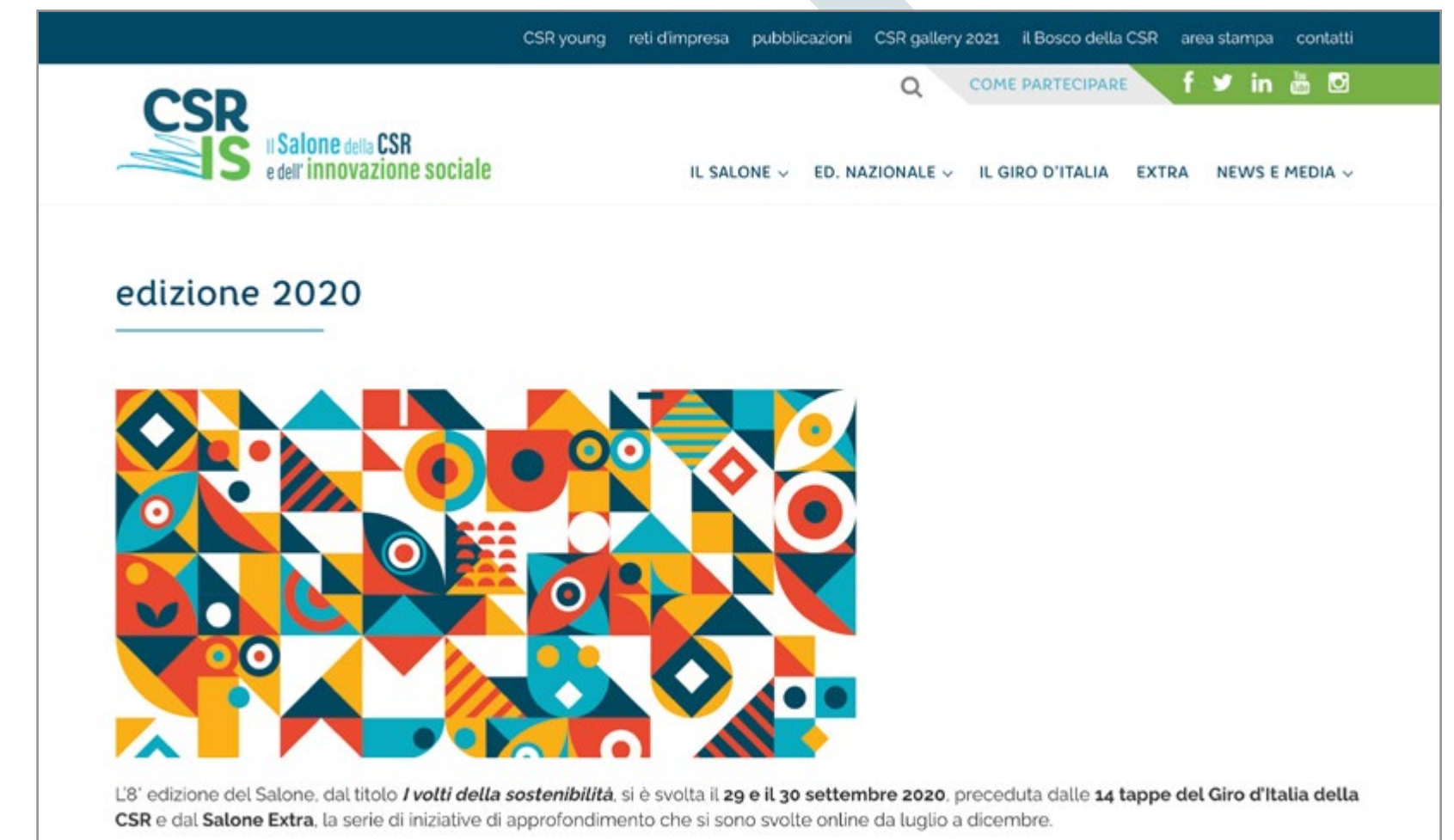
The “CSR and Social Innovation Fair” is the most important event in Italy dedicated to the topic of sustainability. It is a unique occasion for hundreds of key organizations and thousands of visitors to learn, debate and network. Along with the other main organizations working in CSR in Italy, Bocconi University is a member of the Fair’s steering group.

The 8th edition, “The Faces of Sustainability,” was held on 29-30 September 2020. Before the event, the CSR Tour of Italy made 14 stops and the Extra Fair was held, a series of initiatives for in-depth study held online from July to December. 206 organizations, including companies, non-profits, public bodies and startups, took part in the national edition.

The cultural program, featuring 375 speakers, included 80 events divided into 7 topics dedicated to various stakeholders: the environment, customers, industry-dependent communities, suppliers, investors and others. All the events were livestreamed by Bocconi and can be viewed again on the Fair’s YouTube channel.
