The Cyrillic alphabet: origin and reforms. Greetings and polite expressions. Introduction to transliteration.
II	Asking questions: Who is it? – What is it?; Do you speak Russian?;	First and second conjugation verbs: infinitive and present tense of regular verbs. Negative and interrogative forms.	Russian and other Slavic languages. Formal and informal speech. Russian naming system: first name, patronymic, and

Moscow: the capital, its history and spatial dimension (synchronic and diachronic perspectives). Culture and Everyday life: Russian grade system.
IV	Where is it?; where have you been?; expressing possession.	Prepositional case, endings and uses. Possessives "My". The past tense of the verb "to be"; the verb "to live."	Culture and perception of space and time in Russia. Saint Petersburg: Peter the Great and the founding of the new capital.
V	Food and drinks. Apologizing. Listening practice: short audio and video clips with slow natural speech.	The verbs "to eat" and "to drink"; distinction between animate and inanimate nouns. Accusative case of inanimate nouns: endings and usage.	Culture and daily life: the Russian school system; food, drinks, and meals. Introduction to F. Dostoevsky and his role in 19th-century Russian literature.
VI	Weather and climate. Asking "When?"; parts of the day.	Past tense of regular verbs; complements of time (with parts of the day). The future tense: compound form – usage and formation.	Introduction to L. Tolstoy and his major works. Culture and everyday life: the "dacha".
