Overview. This PhD seminar examines 5 of the most pressing challenges facing modern representative democracies through the lens of cutting-edge theoretical and empirical research in comparative politics. We will explore how political institutions, citizen behavior, and policy conflicts interact to shape democratic performance in diverse domestic contexts. Topics range from the erosion of checks and balances and the rise of populism, to affective polarization, climate policy backlash, and the politics of demographic change.

Evaluation. The course grade will be awarded based on completion of either a research project or an extensive literature review on an assigned question relating to representation (50%) and class participation (50%). As part of class participation, students will be expected (on a rotating basis) to find 4–5 additional article-length studies relevant to the challenge under investigation and give a 30-minute presentation describing how those studies contribute to social science knowledge on the question.
