The course offers both a general introduction to, and a more in-depth analysis of, the rapidly evolving European security environment. It focuses on the way in (and the extent to) which the EU addresses the main challenges to the continent's security. Given the everchanging nature of the landscape, special attention will be paid to emerging security threats and recent strategic shocks.

The module provides 1) a historical overview and a broad survey of the institutional landscape, security architecture and policy tools in and across Europe; and especially 2) a balanced analysis of the main issues involved, with a special focus on current challenges and actual policy-making processes in Brussels and beyond.

The first part of the course will focus on the genesis and evolution of EU's (and in part NATO's) approach to security challenges over the past decades and its complex machinery. The final part will address the most recent developments, especially following Russia's fullscale invasion of Ukraine and Donald Trump's return to the White House.

Teaching mode

Final test

The final test of the course will consist of a multiple-choice test that can be taken in presence only. The test will be made up of 15 questions (passed with 8 correct answers).

Faculty for the course

Antonio Missiroli: prior to joining NATO, he was the Director of the European Union Institute for Security Studies (EUISS) in Paris (2012-17). Previously, he was Adviser at the Bureau of European Policy Advisers (BEPA) of the European Commission (2010-2012); Director of Studies at the European Policy Centre in Brussels (2005-2010), and Senior Research Fellow at the W/EU Institute for Security Studies in Paris (1998-2005). He was also Head of European Studies at CeSPI in Rome (1994-97) and a Visiting Fellow at St Antony's College, Oxford (1996-97). As well as being a professional journalist, he has also taught at Bath and Trento as well as Boston University, SAIS/Johns Hopkins, at the College of Europe (Bruges) and Sciences Po (Paris). Dr. Missiroli holds a PhD degree in Contemporary History from the Scuola Normale Superiore (Pisa) and a Master's degree in International Public Policy from SAIS/Johns Hopkins University.
