PLOT

Halloween 1991: three tremendous weather fronts - among which Hurricane Grace - converged to create the greatest storm of all time with Force 12 winds and massive waves over 30 meters high. Captain Billy Tyne (George Clooney) and his crew take out a swordfishing boat for a last try in October after a disappointing season when the fish were not biting for them and they were earning less. They find the fish, but run into a storm to end all storms. The heroic rescue helicopters of the Coast Guard brave the furious storm to try and rescue them, but run out of fuel. The amazing scenes of the turbulent, raging, phenomenal Atlantic Ocean make us realize that contrary to what we have been led to believe, maybe hell is watery. The next time you eat swordfish steak, think of what these Gloucester fishermen have to go through to put that steak on your plate! I won't spoil this riveting, exciting movie by telling you the ending.... What makes it more exciting is that it is a true story with the weather, wind and ocean among the principal actors. Man has not yet been able to control these capricious forces.

LANGUAGE

The cast uses fishermen's technical terms and slang, lots of sexual innuendo, double meanings and plays on words. They often shorten sentences by leaving out subjects or verbs but they are understandable anyway. The accents are typical of the Massachusetts seacoast area and fairly clear.
