

0. MAP OF THE STUDY PATH



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1.1. International Site

The Bocconi international site contains information to help students become familiar with the University and learn how to utilize the numerous online services available.

In addition to the services that can be accessed via Virtual Punto Blu and the <u>voU@B</u> student diary described in this chapter, the site includes:

- the <u>Teaching section</u> that provides updated information on academic calendars, degree programs, courses, Course Directors and office hours;
- the "<u>Didattica Online</u>" section, from which students can access multimedia learning support materials which are available for some courses;
- the <u>Institutes' online bulletin boards</u> that contain the latest information and updates posted by the Institutes;
- the <u>online bulletin board</u> for Teaching Services and Organization;
- the "How to" section that contains brief guides designed for getting to know the University;
- the "<u>Services</u>" section, to check the services and resources available to students throughout their university careers and to find contacts for any help needed.

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1.2. The student kit

The student kit is made up of:

- the unofficial academic transcript;
- Bocconi photo ID card;
- password

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The unofficial academic transcript is a document that, once enrolment has been completed, contains the student's personal details and all the courses foreseen by the program structure. Subsequently the transcript is updated with the dates and marks of exams passed.

The updated transcript - with dates and marks of exams passed - can be printed at anytime from Punto Blu terminals by selecting the UA option as explained in the "Punto Blu, Virtual Punto Blu and Internet points" section in this chapter.

The unofficial academic transcript can be used as a memo but not as a certification. On this transcript teachers may write the marks and dates of exams passed.

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1.2.2. Personalized Bocconi ID card

The personalized Bocconi photo ID card is an essential non-transferable personal document used:

- as proof of identity in the University;
- to sit exams;
- to use IT rooms;
- to use Punto Blu terminals located in the University; see specific sections of this chapter;
- to use the cafeteria;
- to use the Library and to borrow books.

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1.2.2.1. Theft and loss of ID card

If the photo ID card is lost or stolen you should immediately go to:

- the Teaching Services and Organization Desk, (University building, via Sarfatti 25) in order to stop the card from being used by third parties;
- the Library, in order to stop all book loans. Otherwise the original cardholder is obliged to replace any books borrowed.

Students can apply for a replacement card at the Teaching Services and Organization Desk and fill out the application form which can be used as a replacement request as well as a self-declaration of the theft/loss, in cases where the loss or theft report has not been handed in to the local Police or *Carabinieri* station.

1.2.2.2. Replacement of the ID card

If the magnetic strip of the Bocconi ID card no longer works, students can bring it back to the Teaching Services and Organization Desk in order to have it automatically re-magnetized free of charge. Cards that no longer work for reasons other than worn magnetic strips can be replaced on presentation of the old card at the Teaching Services and Organization Desk; in this case a replacement fee is charged (for fees, consult the "Other costs" pdf file).

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1.2.3. Password

Once enrolled, students can use the same password as the one used to enroll online to access the services provided according to the timelines and procedures which are explained in specific paragraphs.

Students may personalize the password in order to have two different ones:

- the Virtual Punto Blu password (see paragraph 1.3) which is valid for:
 - activating the SMS service (see paragraph 1.6);
- the online services password, to:
 - access the <u>voU@B</u> student diary (see paragraph 1.4);
 - access the Bocconi e-mail account (see paragraph 1.5);
 - access the WI-FI network (see paragraph 1.7.1);
 - access online learning activities;
 - access the University network (IT rooms and IT labs).

The online services password may be changed via:

- the <u>voU@B</u> student diary;
- the Webmail program;
- login functions to access the University website from an IT room for students.

The Virtual Punto Blu password may be changed via:

- Punto Blu, using the ID card: in this case the old password is not needed since the ID card identifies the student;
- <u>Virtual Punto Blu</u>: in this case the old password is required.

- don't change the initial password or
- choose two identical passwords

use one password for all services.

For security reasons students are advised to have two passwords and to change them on a regular basis.

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1.2.3.1. Loss of password

The **online services password** may be retrieved using the password recovery function in the <u>yoU@B</u> student diary.

In cases of lost or forgotten Virtual Punto Blu password, students:

- may choose a new one via Punto Blu using their ID card;
- may go to the Teaching Services and Organization Desk (ground floor of University building in via Sarfatti 25).

Password requests can also be made via email to: <u>comunicazioni.didattica@unibocconi.it</u>. The password will only be sent to the student's Bocconi email address.

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1.3. Punto Blu, Virtual Punto Blu and Internet points

Punto Blu is a self-service terminal that allows students to carry out some administrative activities regarding their student academic careers.

Virtual Punto Blu can be accessed via the Internet.

Students can access Punto Blu and Virtual Punto Blu once they have completed enrolment.

Data is updated in real time in the Student Administration Centre records. Therefore, students can check immediately if the operation has been performed successfully.

The service can save students time since they can carry out administrative procedures outside office hours.

Students can choose the display language (Italian or English) to view the Punto Blu/Virtual Punto Blu functions.

To access Punto Blu functions simply insert the Bocconi ID card into the appropriate slot and follow the step-by-step instructions.

To access the Virtual Punto Blu functions students must:

- connect to the International Site at: <u>http://www.unibocconi.it/puntoblueng</u>
- enter the student ID (login) and the Virtual Punto Blu password.

Internet points that provide restricted access to the Bocconi Internet site are located in both the new University building (piazza Sraffa 13) and the entrance hall where the Teaching Services and Organization Desk is located.

It is possible to print certifications (see <u>chapter 8</u>) and receipts for administrative procedures carried out at Punto Blu terminals, whereas web pages from the Internet site can be printed and kept as memos.

1.4. YoU@B student diary

The <u>voU@B</u> student diary is a service offered to all Bocconi students. Students can start using it from the first day after enrolment is completed. The <u>voU@B</u> allows students to organize their own diary, receive information from various University Services, keep personal address books, keep notes, check dates, times and rooms for both exams and graduation sessions, check class timetables and so on. The <u>voU@B</u> student diary is available in both Italian and English. Students can change languages at anytime.

Among the information and services available to students via <u>voU@B</u> there are:

- personalized **class timetables:** students can compile personalized class timetables that may be integrated by selecting courses which are not included in their study plans from the general class timetables;
- **exam timetables:** students can compile personalized exam timetables that may be integrated by selecting exams which are not included in their study plans from the general exam timetables;
- breakdown of students in the classrooms: for exams and partial exams;
- daily room allocations: (for exams, partial exams and various activities);
- exams results (on the condition that they have been sent to the Teaching Services and Organization Desk in electronic format);
- various activities sign-up;
- **notices:** such as messages from the Teaching Services and Organization Desk and other University Services;
- **online diary:** to check one's lessons, exams and administrative deadlines, make appointments and insert events and personal notes;
- personal links;
- contacts: (personal address book);

and, for graduating students:

- the placement form;
- the University experience questionnaire;
- information about graduation.

In addition, during the year and/or for special categories of students, specific functions and procedures can be available such as:

- registration for modules for courses in which they are required;
- enrolment and/or registration for ECDL;
- signing up for supplementary activities.

How to access yoU@B

The <u>voU@B</u> student diary can be accessed from the homepage of the Bocconi website at <u>http://www.unibocconi.it/eng</u> or at <u>http://agenda.unibocconi.it;</u> users must log in.

It is important to note that the <u>yoU@B</u> is the University's main communication tool used for informing students about teaching activities. Therefore, students are kindly asked to frequently check the messages received.

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1.5. Email All currently enrolled students are given a Bocconi email account. Students can use this account free of charge. This service is provided by the University in collaboration with Webmail <u>http://webmail.studbocconi.it</u>.

First-year students are automatically assigned an email address upon enrolment.

The Bocconi email address is composed of: personal ID + @studbocconi.it.

Students may also use an alias address to help them in using their Bocconi email accounts. Students must choose from among the automatically-proposed aliases the first time the <u>yoU@B</u> student diary is accessed. Nonetheless, both email addresses will remain active.

In order to ensure that the system functions correctly after choosing the alias, students should adjust the inbox options by following the "alias settings" instructions. This information is available on the Bocconi site at http://webmail.studbocconi.it

Students are kindly requested to periodically check their personal Bocconi email addresses in order to read the messages sent by the University.

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1.6. SMS

The one-to-one interactive communication service, Bocconi-TIM SIM, allows students to access <u>yoU@B</u> and Virtual Punto Blu services from their mobile phones by simply sending and receiving SMS text messages. This service is activated free of charge for all Bocconi students, regardless of the telephone company used.

Students who activate the SMS service can receive messages from the University free of charge.

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1.7. Personal computer

1.7.1. Internet points at the University

In order to offer wide access to the Bocconi Internet services, there are currently 450 web points located in the <u>University buildings</u> at via Sarfatti 25 and piazza Sraffa 13, which can be used by students to access their laptops with standard configurations.

Students with Wireless laptop connection can access the University Wi-Fi network where available (Velodromo, Sarfatti 25).

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1.7.2. IT rooms for students

4 rooms with a total of 243 personal computers connected to the University network are available to students (data refers to May 2007).

The computers can be used by students who are ready to write their final papers or degree theses, as well as for those who want to use data analysis programs, carry out research, email users and, in general, for other learning activities (computerized exercises).

In addition, 1 room (57 PCs) is available for students who are taking LearningSpace multimedia courses.

All computer work stations are equipped with word processing, electronic spreadsheets and data presentation packages. In addition, there are also programs for carrying out the statistical analysis of quantitative data.

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2. UNDERGRADUATE DEGREE PROGRAM STRUCTURES

For the 2007-2008 a.y., the Economics Faculty will offer 9 undergraduate degree programs.

- 1) The 8 undergraduate degree programs below are part of the Undergraduate School.
 - 5 undergraduate degree programs belonging to the Management field of study no. 17, Ministerial Decree, August 4, 2000:

- Undergraduate Degree in Economia aziendale [Business Administration] (CLEA);
- Undergraduate Degree in Economia delle amministrazioni pubbliche e delle istituzioni internazionali [Management of Public Administration and International Institutions] (CLAPI);
- Undergraduate Degree in Economia delle istituzioni e dei mercati finanziari [Institutions and Financial Markets Management] (CLEFIN);

- Undergraduate Degree in Economia e legislazione per l'impresa [Law and Business Administration] (CLELI);

- Undergraduate Degree in Economia per le arti, la cultura e la comunicazione [Economics and Management of Arts, Culture and Communication] (CLEACC);

• 3 undergraduate degree programs belonging to the Economics field of study no. 28, Ministerial Decree, August 4, 2000:

- Undergraduate Degree in Discipline economiche e sociali [Economics and Social Sciences] (DES);

- Undergraduate Degree in Economia dei mercati internazionali e delle nuove tecnologie [Economics of International Markets and New Technologies] (CLEMIT);

- Undergraduate Degree in Economia e management internazionali - International Economics and Management (DIEM).

The University reform of 1999, through the joint agreement of the European Ministers of Education meeting in Bologna, transformed the organization of the Italian university by changing the structure of the study plan of the degree programs in the fields of Economics and Management; from one long cycle of four years to the so-called 3 plus 2, structured in two cycles (undergraduate and graduate).

The result of a homogeneous course of studies in Europe was the free movement of students in the universities during their educational training and subsequently the movement of graduates in the world of work.

The two study cycles are to be considered separate; at the end of each, a final exam is required, as well as the awarding of a diploma and the certification of the title obtained.

Once the 3-year cycle has been completed the student can decide whether to enter the world of work or continue his university studies by enrolling in the graduate program (Master of Science or a Specialized Master).

Since the start of the Università Bocconi graduate programs, the selection process has been distinct from the undergraduate one; therefore admission to an undergraduate degree program does not imply the automatic admission to a Master of Science program.

The selection criteria for the graduate programs are defined by the organs of administration during the annual plan of activities and are published on the Internet website and in the Bocconi information pack before the candidates' assessment procedure takes place.

2) The following undergraduate degree program, belonging to the Legal Studies field of study no. 31, Ministerial Decree, August 4, 2000, is part of the Università Bocconi School of Law:

• Undergraduate Degree in Scienze giuridiche [Law] (CLSG).

The Bocconi graduates in the Undergraduate Degree in Scienze Giuridiche [Law] (CLSG) are admitted to the Master of Science in Giurisprudenza [Law] (CLG-LS) on condition that they manage to graduate within the October session.

The admission procedure has been activated since the 2006-2007 academic year, in conjunction with the activation of the long-cycle Combined Bachelor and Master of Science in Giurisprudenza [Law].

On average class groups are made up of 130 students each, except for the CLSG class groups which have approximately 150 students, and are structured in this way:

The program requirements are expressed in credit points.

A credit point (CP) is the unit of measurement which determines the workload required from each student with adequate initial preparation in order to carry out the educational activities required for the program structure. The amount of work required includes classroom teaching activities (lessons, exercises, seminars), individual study and other educational activities such as preparation of the final paper.

According to the ECTS system, each credit point corresponds to an average of 25 hours of work for the student, 8 of which (and no more than 10) are dedicated to classroom teaching activities.

The average workload required of a full-time student is fixed at 60 credit points per year as per agreement.

Therefore, in order to fulfil the program requirements each student must obtain 180 credit points.

Credit points are awarded for all educational activities carried out by students, including exams for both compulsory and elective courses, foreign language assessment tests, computer skills tests and the final paper.

Credit points do not replace exam marks but are awarded when the marks of exams that students have passed are registered.

Credit points and exam marks make up the academic transcripts of students.

It should be noted that in order to graduate, the university reform requires knowledge of 2 European Union languages, apart from Italian, for degree programs in the Economics and Management fields of study (first and second language), and at least 1 European Union language, apart from Italian, for degree programs in the Legal Studies field of study (first foreign language).

2.1.1. Educational objectives

While adhering to the educational objectives concerning the program's field of study, the Undergraduate Degree in Economia aziendale [Business Administration] (CLEA) has the following specific objectives:

- to provide a complete picture of the economic, financial, social, legal, cultural and technological aspects that characterize the operations of different types of companies, their groups and the environments in which they operate;
- to transmit a basic knowledge of management, organizational and research aspects present in the different types of companies and, in particular, in companies of various dimensions operating in different economic contexts;
- to develop the basic abilities:
 - to analyze business and environmental aspects;
 - to make decisions in complex economic and social contexts;
 - for innovation, entrepreneurship, and management.

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2.1.2. Career opportunities

Possible career opportunities are:

- professional and managerial positions in various business departments (marketing and sales, finance, personnel, business administration, etc);
- consultancy;
- entrepreneurial activities (either working for oneself or in a family-run business) and management positions (in medium and large companies).

The preparation acquired will allow graduates to continue in advanced studies in a variety of fields, immediately after graduation or after a period of employment.

Since the start of the Università Bocconi graduate programs, the selection process has been distinct from the undergraduate one; therefore admission to an undergraduate degree program does not imply the automatic admission to a Master of Science program.

2.1.3. Program requirements breakdown

The program requirements of **180** credit points are divided as follows:

The academic curriculum provides:

- broad, interdisciplinary, basic preparation (political economics, business economics, law, history, quantitative methods, IT) particularly in the first year;
- in-depth knowledge of the problems and methodology connected to various business functions and processes (marketing, finance, production, logistics, organization, accounting, etc);
- in-depth discussion of topics connected with structure and economic control with reference to companies, particularly in the second and third years.

7 Italian class groups and 1 English class group for the second year of studies will be offered in the 2007-2008 a.y.

The language entry requirements for admission to the first year of a class group taught in English are:

- First Certificate in English (FCE), or
- Business English Certificate Vantage, or
- Business English Certificate Higher, or
- IELTS with a minimum mark of 6.5 out of 9, or
- Valid TOEFL certification with a minimum mark of 567 out of 677 (if paper based) or 227 out of 300 (if computer based), or 86 out of 120 (if internet based)
- Certificate in Advanced English (CAE), or
- Certificate of Proficiency in English (CPE), or
- secondary school diploma in English, valid for admission to Italian universities, (at least 50% of the subjects in the curriculum must have been taught in English) or

• English native speaker.

3. EDUCATIONAL ACTIVITIES IN THE STUDY PLANS

3.1. Compulsory courses

Every program structure includes **compulsory** courses for exams which must be passed by students enrolled in that study program.

Compulsory courses are needed in order to satisfy the study program requirements; they are the fundamental building blocks for achieving the program's educational objectives. According to current regulations these educational activities can be classified as: "basic", "characteristic" of the program's field of study or "similar or supplementary to the characteristic ones", with special regard to cultural context and interdisciplinary education, as well as "independently decided upon by the University". Chapter 2 contains a section devoted to each undergraduate degree program where students can find the detailed program structure with the list of all compulsory courses, their credit point value and positioning in the years of studies.

Compulsory course exams can be taken in universities abroad as part of the programs offered by the International Relations Service. No credits will be given to students who have taken exams which are "not recognized" (see chapter 5.14, paragraph "Credit for exams passed at universities abroad"). Exams can be recognized either in full or partially after the course program has been integrated. The list of exams which are "not recognized" is available on the website at <u>http://www.unibocconi.it/exams3</u> in List of compulsory exams which are "not recognized".

Course profiles are available on the website.

These profiles are identified with the following initials:

CC compulsory course of the study program

CO compulsory course chosen as an alternative to another compulsory course for the same study program.

Detailed course programs (**course syllabuses**) are available from the secretary's office of the Institute responsible for the course, and are usually handed out by teachers in the classrooms on the first days of lessons.

Elective courses are chosen by students for their individual study plans, chosen from among the group of courses offered by the University and/or offered in collaboration with other universities.

These courses are part of the "educational activities freely chosen by the student" in accordance with current regulations.

The program structures of all undergraduate degree programs offered by Bocconi require students to choose 2 elective courses, with the exception of the DIEM where students must choose 4 elective courses.

For the undergraduate degree programs CLEA, CLAPI, CLEFIN, CLELI, DES, CLEMIT and CLSG students must choose:

- the first elective from among the restricted group of courses offered for the study program;
- the second elective from among the broad group of courses, made up of all the restricted groups (including those offered by their own program) as well as some courses that are not included in the restricted group for various undergraduate degree programs (see note at the end of paragraph 3.2.10).

CLEACC students must choose both electives from the broad group.

DIEM students must choose:

- the first 2 electives from the restricted group;
- the other 2 from the broad group.

The exams for electives can be taken at universities abroad as part of the programs offered by the International Relations Service.

Students can receive credit for the exams recognized either in full or partially after the course program has been integrated.

Exams equivalent to electives offered by Università Bocconi can be taken abroad, while electives not equivalent to courses offered by Università Bocconi can only be taken as part of the Exchange Program, in particular cases.

In this case students must obtain approval from the Program Director or his/her delegate prior to departure for the partner university abroad.

Students choose their electives when they enroll in the third year of studies, following the procedure described in Chapter 7 "Continuing studies".

Before choosing their electives students are advised to consult the "Table of incompatible courses" and the "Table of banned courses" that can be found in the appendix. The "Table of incompatible

courses" indicates the courses that cannot be chosen together in the same study plan because their course programs are either exactly or partly similar. The "Table of banned courses" indicates the courses that cannot be included in the study plan of a specific program.

The following list contains all the electives included in the restricted groups for each undergraduate degree. Every elective is awarded 6 credit points.

With regard to educational objectives of the undergraduate degree programs, the list of electives in the restricted group may be subject to changes decided on by the organs of administration.

Course profiles are available on the <u>website</u> These profiles are identified with the following initials: **RR** elective course from the restricted group **AI** electives from the broad group

Detailed course programs (**course syllabuses**) are available from the secretary's office of the Institute responsible for the course and they are also usually handed out by teachers in the classrooms on the first days of lessons.

The educational offer for the 2007-2008 academic year will include an e-learning class group for some elective courses already taught in the same semester with traditional methods.

3.3.2.1. First foreign language for all undergraduate degree programs except the DIEM

Program structure position and credit points

The first foreign language is positioned in the second year of the program structure.

The objective of the course is to provide students with the skills to use the language in a general context.

The language path offered by the University takes place in the first and second years of Undergraduate programs.

The course is assigned 6 credit points, which are awarded to students when they pass the exam or after the submission and registration in their academic career of one of the international language certifications recognized by the University (see Paragraph 3.3.4 "Method of assessing foreign language knowledge").

The assessment of foreign language knowledge is marked out of thirty and the mark is included in the calculation of the Grade Point Average (GPA).

Method of choosing a first foreign language

• For all students who are **not English native speakers**, the first foreign language must be **English**.

The exit level from the language learning path is **C1** in keeping with the Council of Europe framework.

However, in light of the students' different linguistic levels on entry, the University allows students to exit from the language path with a lower linguistic level, i.e. **B2.** The course code is **5127**.

• For all students who are **English native speakers**, the first foreign language must be chosen from **French**, **German**, **Portuguese** and **Spanish**.

Students must reach level **B2**. The course codes are: **5128 French 5295 Portuguese**

English (for students who are not English native speakers)

Università Bocconi has identified the recommended entry requirements to ensure that students are adequately prepared to attend the curricular English language courses. The requirements are level B1 of the Common European Framework for Language Competence (see paragraph 3.3.1 "The Common European Framework"). On the Internet site at http://www.unibocconi.it/languagecentre in Teaching and orientation >Undergraduate degraa programs (III academic year 2007-2008), students can find detailed information regarding the language knowledge and competence required and self-study programs to assist them in reaching the indicated level based on their initial preparation.

Initial evaluation test

On the same day as the aptitude selection test, all non-native English speakers should have also taken an English language test. On the basis of this test, the student's ideal language path is assigned for the first year of studies.

The Language learning path

The educational activities designed to assist students in learning English are organized by the Language Centre. These activities include both C1 and B2 level curricular courses and preparatory modules for students who have not yet acquired sufficient linguistic competence. The University proposes an individual, personalized learning plan upon enrolment based on the student's initial language level. For absolute beginners the following paths are offered:

Students can sign up via the <u>voU@B</u> student diary according to the following periods: first semester class group: 1 August - 28 September 2007; second semester class group: 7-31 January 2008. Applications are accepted on a first come, first serve basis for a maximum of 100 students per class group. The courses are run only if there are enough students.

Students state their desired exit level when they register for the final exam via Punto Blu or Virtual Punto Blu regardless of the module(s) or course(s) attended.

For students who have a language exam debit, language changes can be made in the periods 1 August - 28 September 2007 and 7-31 January 2008. Changes can be made via Punto Blu or Virtual Punto Blu.

Students must state their desired exit level when they register for the final exam at Punto Blu terminals regardless of the module(s) or course(s) attended.

3.3.3.1. Second foreign language for all undergraduate degrees in the fields of economics and management

Program structure position and credit points

The second foreign language is placed in the third year of the program structure in either the first or second semester, depending on the Undergraduate program: I semester: CLAPI, CLELI, CLEMIT II semester: CLEA, CLEFIN, CLEACC, DES, DIEM

Students can choose to sit the exam in either the first or second semester exam sessions regardless of which semester the course is placed in the program structure.

The objective of the course is to provide students with the ability to use the language appropriately.

The language path offered by the University takes place in the second and third years of studies.

The course is assigned 6 credit points, which are awarded to students when they pass the exam or after the submission and registration in their academic career of one of the international language certifications recognized by the University (see Paragraph 3.3.4 "Method of assessing foreign language knowledge").

The assessment of foreign language knowledge is marked out of thirty and the mark is included in the calculation of the Grade Point Average (GPA).

Method of choosing second foreign language

 For students who are Italian native speakers, the second foreign language must be chosen from French, Portuguese, Spanish, German. The course codes are: 5128 French

5295 Portuguese

5130 Spanish

5129 German

• For students who are **not Italian native speakers** the second language must be Italian. The course code is **5239**.

The exit level from the language learning path is **B2** of the Council of Europe's Framework. However, in light of the students' different linguistic levels on entry, the University allows them to exit from the language path with a lower linguistic level, i.e. **B1**.

• For students who are not **Italian native speakers** and who are enrolled in the Central European University (CEU) - Università Bocconi Double Degree Program, the second

language must be Italian. The course code is **5239**. The exit level is **B1** of the Council of Europe's Framework.

French, Portuguese, Spanish, German (for Italian native speakers)

Initial evaluation test

There is no compulsory initial evaluation test for French, Portuguese, Spanish and German although a self-evaluation test is available on the Internet site at <u>http://www.unibocconi.it/languagecentre</u> > Learning Services > self-evaluation tests for foreign languages. Students are invited to take this test before enrolling for the second year of the program.

The language learning path

The teaching activities designed to assist students in learning French, Portuguese, Spanish and German are organized by the Language Centre and include both levels **B2** and **B1** curricular courses as well as preparatory modules for students who have not yet acquired sufficient linguistic competence.

The student's language level is ascertained by the self-evaluation test. Accordingly, the University will suggest an individual and personalized learning plan to the student. This may mean: attending preparatory modules either completely or partially based on linguistic competence, taking curricular courses or sitting the exam.

The language paths are as follows:

(*) B1 serves two purposes: as a curricular course for students who wish to take the final B1 exam and as a preparatory module to attend the B2 curricular course.

For the 2007-2008 a.y. only modules and courses of the third year will be run.

Third-year students must confirm and/or change the language they chose in the second year of the course (or choose a language if they did not do so in the second year) when they enrol in the academic year (Punto Blu or Virtual Punto Blu, between 1 August - 10 September 2007). Students must also choose the modules they wish to attend in the first and second semesters (B1 in first semester and B2 in second semester; only B1 in first semester; only B1 in second semester; only B2 in second semester); they will automatically be assigned the class group level according to the choices made for both the first and second semesters.

Students can change languages in their third year from 7-31 January 2008, via Punto Blu terminals or Virtual Punto Blu.

The class timetable can be viewed at Punto Blu terminals and the yoU@B student diary after enrolment for the academic year.

Attendance is not compulsory but strongly recommended; attending modules and courses is considered to be the most effective way of learning the language and preparing for the final exam. Active participation in a curricular course may result in awarding 1 or 2 extra points to the final exam mark. Detailed information is presented in the exam requirements for every language and they are available on the Internet site at http://www.unibocconi.it/languagecentre in Teaching and orientation >Undergraduate degree programs (third year 2007-2008 a.y.).

Students must declare their desired exit level when they register for the final exam at one of the Punto Blu terminals regardless of the module(s) or course(s) attended.

Italian (for students who are not Italian native speakers)

Initial evaluation test

Non-EU students who do not have Italian residency must take an Italian language test organized by the University in accordance with the Ministerial regulations.

With reference to all other students who are not Italian native speakers there is no initial evaluation test for Italian organized by the University, although students are invited to take a self-evaluation test available on the Internet site at <u>http://www.unibocconi.it/languagecentre</u> > Learning Services > self-evaluation tests for foreign languages.

The language learning path

The teaching activities for Italian are organized by the Language Centre, and include both levels **B2** and **B1** curricular courses. Preparatory modules for students who have not yet acquired sufficient linguistic competence are also scheduled.

Accordingly, the University will suggest to the student an individual, personalized learning plan upon enrolment based on the student's language level. This plan may include attending preparatory modules either completely or partially based on linguistic competence, taking curricular courses or sitting the exam to assess language skills.

The language learning paths are as follows:

(*) B1 serves two purposes: as a curricular course for students who wish to take the final B1 exam and as a preparatory module to attend the B2 curricular course.

For the 2007-2008 a.y. only modules and courses of the third year will be run. For students enrolled in the Joint Degree Central European University (CEU) - Università Bocconi Program, only 2nd-year modules of Italian can be run.

Second-year students enrolled in the Joint Degree Central European University (CEU) - Università Bocconi Program, are automatically assigned an A2 level class group when they enrol in the academic year (between 1 August - 10 September 2007). The class will be run only if enough students sign up.

Third-year, Italian, non-native speakers, when enrolling in the academic year (via Punto Blu or Virtual Punto Blu, between 1 August - 10 September 2007) choose the modules for the 1st and 2nd semester (B1 in the first and B2 in the second semester; only B1 in the first semester; only B2 in the second semester). They will automatically be assigned the class group according to the choices made.

The class timetable can be viewed at Punto Blu terminals and viewed in the yoU@B student diary.

Attendance is not compulsory but strongly recommended; attending modules and courses is considered to be the most effective way of learning the language and preparing for the final exam. Active participation in a curricular course may result in awarding 1 or 2 extra points to the final exam mark. Detailed information is presented in the exam requirements for every language and they are available on the Internet site at <u>http://www.unibocconi.it/languagecentre</u> in Teaching and orientation >Undergraduate degree programs.

Students must state their desired exit level when they register for the final exam at Punto Blu terminals or Virtual Punto Blu regardless of the module(s) or course(s) attended.

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3.3.3.2. Second foreign language for students of the Undergraduate Degree in Scienze Giuridiche [Law] (CLSG)

A second foreign language is an option for students enrolled in the CLSG and can be included in the student's study plan instead of the educational activity "project/seminars" in the third year of studies. For information on the methods for adding a second foreign language to the study plan see 7.1.4.

The course codes are: 5323 French 5325 Portuguese 5326 Spanish 5327 German

The language learning path offered by the University is the same as the one offered for the Bachelor programs in the fields of Economics and Management.

The language course is awarded 6 credit points. Students obtain the credits when they pass the exam or register one of the international certifications recognized by the University (see 3.3.4 "Method of assessing foreign language knowledge").

The exam is marked out of thirty and is included in the calculation of the Grade Point Average (GPA). Students are free to attend the class groups scheduled for Bachelor programs in the fields of Economics and Management.

In such programs the teaching is scheduled over 2 semesters (third year); the course unit covers "general" English and includes an A2 level (pre-intermediate) initial language knowledge. CLSG students enrolled for the 2007-08 academic year can only attend third-year lessons.

For methods on choosing the second language, evaluation tests and learning paths, see the paragraph "Second foreign language for Bachelor programs in the fields of Economics and Management".

Please note that:

- it is possible to include a second foreign language in the study plan as an additional exam;
- an international language certification registered in the student's undergraduate academic career as an alternative to projects/seminars or as an additional exam, cannot be included in the MSc study plan.

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3.3.4. Method of assessing foreign language knowledge

Assessment of foreign language knowledge by Bocconi exam

Language knowledge is assessed by an exam. This exam is designed to test the student's comprehension and knowledge of both written and spoken English adapted to the appropriate language level.

The summarized course programs (**course profiles**) of the language modules are available on the Internet site at <u>http://www.unibocconi.it/profiles</u>.

The detailed course programs (**course syllabuses and exam requirements**) are available on the Internet site at <u>http://www.unibocconi.it/languagecentre</u> in Teaching and orientation >Undergraduate degree programs (III year 2007-2008 a.y.).

The exam is marked out of thirty and is included in the calculation of the Grade Point Average (GPA). Students must state their exit level chosen between the two possible exit levels suggested by the University when they register for the exam at Punto Blu terminals or Virtual Punto Blu. The level of competence achieved is recorded on the official exam report and official academic transcript. As an alternative to the Bocconi exam, students may choose to take one of the international certification exams indicated by the University, requesting that the results achieved be converted into a mark out of thirty and recorded in their academic career by the Language Centre Office.

Students can achieve higher exit levels than the curricular exams for both first and second languages. This is only possible through the registration of international certifications in the academic career from among those recognized by the University.

Assessment of foreign language knowledge by international language certifications

If students opt for a certification exam they can choose to sit the exam through either:

- the Bocconi Language Centre, if it is a recognized exam centre for the chosen certification;
- an official Examination Centre either in Italy or abroad.

The cost of sitting the certification exam is the responsibility of the individual student. The Language Centre also offers guidance and information on exam preparation and exam assessment methods and provides a range of materials which are available for use from the language laboratories. This service is offered to all students (those taking Bocconi exams or preparing international certifications).

Students who already hold one of the certifications indicated by the University may ask for the result of the certification exam to be converted into a mark out of thirty and recorded instead of the Bocconi exam.

For students enrolled from the 2004-2005 a.y., for the purpose of registering international certifications in the academic career, certifications are valid for a period of three years from the date they were obtained.

It should be noted that if students hold international certifications of higher levels than the level indicated in the program requirements, these will be recognized when the graduation grade is calculated (see chapter 6 "Awarding of the graduate grade").

In addition to the list of "general" language international certifications published in the appendix "international certifications" the University also recognizes special language certifications for MSc programs published on the website at <u>http://www.unibocconi.it/languagecentre</u>.

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3.4.1. Program structure position and credit points

The program requirements of all undergraduate programs offered at Università Bocconi include a Computer skills exam (4 credit points) in the first year of studies. This course aims to develop students' IT knowledge and skills in accordance with the current regulations in force regarding undergraduate degrees in the Management, Economics and Legal Studies fields of study.

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3.4.2. Assessment of knowledge

IT knowledge and skills are assessed by the ECDL Start (European Computer Driving Licence), an internationally recognized certificate which enables students to demonstrate their competence in Windows, Office Applications and the Internet.

Università Bocconi is an official ECDL Test Centre.

In order to obtain the licence it is necessary to pass the following 4 exam modules:

- Resource management (module 2);
- Word (module 3);
- Excel (module 4);
- Internet (module 7) .

To pass modules students must answer at least 75% or more of exam questions correctly. When each module is passed the mark is registered on the Skills Card. The ECDL Start is awarded when all 4 modules have been passed.

The overall result achieved from the 4 modules is converted into a mark out of thirty and recorded in the student's academic career. In particular, the average of the percentages achieved for each of the 4 modules is calculated. The average percentage is then converted into a mark out of thirty on the basis of the conversion table shown below.

The mark out of thirty is included in the calculation of the Grade Point Average.

Please note: students that have passed any of the modules before 2004 must use the calculation method available on the IT Education Services Center (SEDIN) website at <u>http://www.unibocconi.it/sedin</u> (Italian version).

All students (attending and non attending) can sit the exam on the date fixed by the Bocconi Test Centre. Exam registration is done in person at the SEDIN office.

If students have already passed this exam at secondary school, they can complete the form online via their yoU@B student diary. If exams have not been taken through an automatic system (ALICE or ATLAS), then students must hand in a declaration indicating the score achieved (expressed as a percentage) for every exam passed. The declaration must be issued on the Test Center's official paper and submitted at the IT Education Services Center (SEDIN).

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3.5. Studying abroad

Internationalization at Università Bocconi has been a strategic priority pursued since 1974, the year in which the first international agreements were put into place. Over the years these programs have developed an extensive network of relations and exchanges with prestigious academic and cultural institutions all over the world, which means there is constant collaboration with the university and

international business schools on research and joint teaching projects, thus providing Bocconi students and teaching staff with invaluable international experience.

Thanks to its network of international relations, Università Bocconi is able to offer its students several opportunities to acquire the kind of business training which is necessary for dealing with global economic developments.

Study programs abroad:

- Long programs (Exchange Programs and Free-Mover Semester Programs);
- Short programs (Campus Abroad and Free-Mover Summer Programs).

MSc students may participate in Double Degree programs that are organized with international universities and business schools which lead to second level Double Degrees (Italian and foreign) or diplomas issued by members of the international network (Master CEMS-MIM, Themis Law Network).

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3.5.1. Long programs

Exchange Program

The Università Bocconi Exchange Program (including the Erasmus Program) deals with student exchanges under bilateral agreements with over 160 universities in 46 countries spreading across 5 continents, giving students the opportunity to attend courses for which they can receive credit as part of their Bocconi degrees. The international universities included in the program are some of the most renowned institutions in the world in the field of management, economics and social sciences with an emphasis on economics. In fact, Università Bocconi belongs to 2 of the most prestigious international networks: CEMS - Community of European Management Schools and PIM - Partnership in International Management.

The agreements are based on reciprocal arrangements that allow students from both institutions involved to complete a period of study abroad without paying extra university fees and tuition to the partner institution. Students are, however, responsible for travel, board and lodging expenses.

The semester program is offered to all students who are regularly enrolled at Bocconi in their third year, **so students enrolled in the second year can apply.**

Students who are selected and subsequently withdraw from the Exchange Program (except for reasons that are judged by the International Relations Service to be very serious), will be automatically excluded from subsequent pre-selection for all exchange programs and international internships offered by the International Relations Service (Field Projects, International Organizations and Embassies). If students withdraw during their undergraduate studies, they are not excluded from the program if they enrol in MSc programs.

Exam recognition

Students can receive credit for a maximum of 4 exams recognized either fully or partially. The credit approval procedure is explained in paragraph 5.14, "Credit for exams passed at universities abroad".

Final paper

Exchange experiences can be linked to final papers. See paragraph 6.1, "Final paper".

Graduation Grade

Exchange Program participation counts as part of "other academic achievements in the student's academic career" and is included in the calculation of the graduation grade. See paragraph 6.2.5, "Awarding of the graduation grade", in this Guide.

For Exchange Program details, (eligibility, list of universities, application procedure, exam recognition, program compatibility, student relations, previously recognized courses, etc), visit the website <u>http://www.ir.unibocconi.it/exchange</u> and consult the International Relations Service publications.

Free-Mover Semester Program

Students interested in attending a semester abroad outside the Exchange Program, can enrol at a number of universities abroad where they can study only during the third year of their degree as part of the Free-Mover Semester Program (fee-paying Visiting Students or Independent Students). Università Bocconi has identified a number of schools, mainly members of its international network, that are willing to accept such students. The list of universities abroad is published on the webpage at http://www.ir.unibocconi.it/eng. This is the only list considered valid for the recognition of exams taken in schools abroad as part of the Free-Mover Semester Program. Any other applications for alternatives must be examined individually beforehand, by the International Relations Service. The application must be accompanied by a motivational letter and some information about the chosen university, and is to be submitted to the International Relations Service before enrolling at the university abroad for a Free Mover Semester Program.

Application procedure

Students who meet the requirements should contact their chosen institution and ask for course profiles and details about the enrolment procedures.

Once students have been admitted by a school of the Free_Mover Semester network, they must contact the International Relations Service and request the green form to have courses taken abroad recognized.

Students are responsible for travel, board and lodging expenses for the period abroad, as well as fees and tuition for both Bocconi and the institution abroad. Students are advised to take out health insurance for the entire period of study abroad.

Exam recognition

Students can receive credit for a maximum of 3 exams recognized.

The credit approval procedure is explained in paragraph 5.14, "Credit for exams passed at universities abroad".

Final paper

The Free-Mover Semester can be linked to final papers. See paragraph 6.1, "Final paper".

Graduation grade

Free-Mover Semester participation counts as "other relevant elements in the student's academic career" and is included in the calculation of the graduation grade. See paragraph 6.2.5, "Awarding of the graduation grade".

For program details (eligibility, list of universities, application procedure, exam recognition, program compatibility, student relations, et), visit the website http://www.ir.unibocconi.it and consult the International Relations Service publications.

NB: Students are reminded that, in any case, receiving credit for exams taken abroad in the Free-Mover Semester is **incompatible** with the Exchange Program.

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3.5.2. Short programs

The short programs offered by Università Bocconi give students the opportunity to spend a brief period of time abroad, generally during summer, combining educational activities with the exploration of different cultural, social and economic environments.

Campus Abroad

The Campus Abroad programs are organized by Università Bocconi in collaboration with partner schools and last about 1 month. The programs aim to expose students to an international context by combining a Bocconi course with a series of "country specific" activities (seminars and visits to local companies and institutions).

Eligibility and requirements

The program is designed for regularly enrolled Bocconi students, from the summer of their second year.

Students are admitted to the program depending on the outcome of the selection process which is based on their GPA, number of credit points and language skills. For recent editions of this program students have been required to have a minimum GPA of 22/30, a minimum number of credit points and English language skills.

Application and deadlines

The application deadline is usually in the months of November and March (the precise dates will be released in the International Relations publications and on the website). For more information visit the website at http://www.ir.unibocconi.it/eng (http://www.ir.unibocconi.it/eng (http://www.ir.unibocconi.it/campusabroad) and check successive publications released by the service.

Exam recognition

The exams are recognized as Bocconi exams and are not listed under "Credit for Exams Passed at Universities Abroad". To have exams and credit points registered in their academic career, students must pass the exam and participate in both lessons and related activities.

Students are reminded that their participation in all activities and presence for the entire period of the program is compulsory.

Final paper

Campus Abroad experiences can be regarded as part of the final paper. See paragraph 6.1, "Final paper".

Graduation grade

Campus Abroad participation counts as "other relevant elements in the student's academic career" and is included in the calculation of the graduation grade only if exams are passed in the Campus Abroad regime. For detailed information see the website at <u>http://www.ir.unibocconi.it/eng</u> and paragraph 6.2.5, "Awarding of the graduation grade".

Free-Mover Summer Program

Università Bocconi has selected a number of partner schools from its international network which offer interesting and educationally valid Summer Programs. They last between 3 to 5 weeks during the summer months and allow students to take curricular courses in various areas for which they can receive credit. The list of universities abroad will be published on the website at http://www.ir.unibocconi.it/eng. This is the only list considered valid for the recognition of courses offered in the Summer Program through institutions abroad. Students can submit applications for other alternatives that must be examined individually in advance by the International Relations Service, before applying to the program.

Eligibility and requirements

The program is offered to students from all undergraduate degrees, **starting from the summer of their 2nd year** (N.B. participation in a summer program in the summer of their 1st year or before cannot be recognized). Università Bocconi does not carry out any type of selection process, however students must satisfy the entry requirements established by the institution chosen for the Summer Program.

Application procedure

The International Relations Service provides informational guidance, making available the websites of the various programs and any brochures of partner institutions. Students are required to contact their chosen destination to obtain course programs and details of the enrolment procedures. Students are responsible for travel, board and lodging expenses as well as the fees and tuition of the partner university. Students are also encouraged to ensure that they have health insurance coverage for the period abroad. Once students have been accepted to the Free-Mover Summer Program by the institution they have chosen, they must go to the International Relations Service and collect the green credit approval form to have courses taken abroad recognized.

Exam recognition

Students can receive credit for the maximum of one exam recognized either in full or after the course program has been integrated. The credit approval procedure is explained in paragraph 5.14, "Credit for exams passed at universities abroad".

Final paper

Free-Mover Summer experiences can be linked to final papers. See paragraph 6.1 "Final Paper".

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3.5.3. Scholarships for international programs

Students taking part in international programs can apply for scholarships from ISU Bocconi (Student Assistance and Financial Aid) and the TCA - University Fees Office (for information about scholarships and application forms, download the pdf file "Conditions for awarding scholarships" which is available on the ISU website in the download area). Students chosen for the Exchange Program for one semester of study at a European institution which has signed a bilateral Erasmus agreement will receive an Erasmus scholarship from the European Union.

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3.6. Internships in Italy and abroad

Three-year Undergraduate programs allow students to include an educational internship experience in their study plans. The internship is part of the "pertinent activities in the student's curriculum" that make up the graduation grade (see paragraph 6.2.5, "Awarding of the graduation grade").

Internship characteristics

Internships must satisfy the following characteristics involving duration, objectives and contents, location and positioning.

Duration

An internship can last from 2 to 6 months, and is generally full-time though some flexibility is possible.

Objectives and contents

The main objective of internships is to educate. They allow students to gain real work world and professional experience while developing professional skills. They help students get their bearings in these environments and facilitate their professional choices. Students gain direct knowledge of the continuously evolving world of work. The contents of the internship must be consistent with the

educational objectives of the student's degree program. Throughout the internship, students are supported by a tutor in the firm/organization and a University tutor. The internship experience may also be useful for writing the final paper (see paragraph 6.1"Final paper").

Location

Internships may take place - in Italy and abroad - in firms, public and private institutions, professional studios, international organisms, diplomatic agencies, cultural institutions and other organizations.

Positioning

Students may participate in internships during their **third year**. Students may participate in an internship only after completing second-year lessons. Internships are registered in students' academic careers as a third-year educational activity.

Organizational aspects

Finding internships

Università Bocconi recognizes internships organized by any of the following parties:

- the Career Service (see following paragraphs);
- International Relations Service (SRI) International Internship Office (see following paragraphs).

Students can also find internships via their own channels. In this case, the University will carefully monitor the internship opportunity. In addition, students must contact the Career Service - Internship Office or the SRI - International Internship Office well in advance and in any case before starting the internship.

The Career Service and International Internship Office (SRI) work together with the Directors of the Undergraduate Programs to make the internship characteristics uniform (host company experience and activities to be carried out) and to ensure that they meet the educational objectives of the Undergraduate program and educational paths.

Whatever channel is used to find an internship, the host company or organization and Bocconi sign an agreement and a training project on the objectives and contents of the traineeship. As the promoter of the initiative, the University prepares all the necessary legal documentation, checks the quality of the training projects, and provide insurance coverage.

All internship experiences must be previously approved to ensure the quality and consistency of the educational path.

Registration

The internship must be recorded in the student's academic career by the deadline for the graduation reservation. Generally, the internship must have been finished by that date.

Any uncompleted internships which have satisfied the minimum duration of time indicated above will still be recognized and can be registered in the student's academic career. In this case, the end of internship documents must be completed within the time needed to record the internship in the student's academic career by the deadline for the graduation reservation.

Contributions for internships in Italy and abroad

For students taking part in internships offered by public authorities in Italy, or through international organizations, institutions, authorities and companies abroad promoted by the Career Service and the International Internship Office (SRI) for which no compensation is provided, contributions are available from Università Bocconi: for allocation criteria and application forms see the website at http://www.unibocconi.it/financialaid in the Download Area.

Other activities recognized in lieu of internships

Types of contracts, many of which were introduced with the "legge Biagi" (Biagi law) such as Servizio Civile Nazionale Volontario (Voluntary National Civil Service), and apprenticeships to obtain a diploma or for highly professional courses may be recognized as training activities "similar to internships". To have the activity recognized, apply to the Career Service.

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3.6.1. Internships in Italy and abroad organized by the Career Service

The Career Service - Internships Office is the University's point of contact for all internship activities, with the exception of programs organized by the International Relations Service - International Internship Office (see paragraph 3.6.2).

The Career Service promotes internship opportunities both **in Italy** and **abroad** with public and private organizations:

- industrial and commercial companies, service providers, banks, financial institutions;
- consulting and auditing firms, professional (e.g. accountants) and legal studios;
- government sector, public agencies and non-profit organizations;
- cultural and artistic institutions;
- authorities and companies operating in the tourism, communication and media industries.

The Service organizes all administrative procedures required by current regulations.

Furthermore, the Career Service gives useful information to assist students in identifying other opportunities based on specific needs and interests. It also helps students make their applications more effective through individual consultation and seminars.

In addition to what has already been said in terms of its characteristics, an internship - known also as traineeship - is an experience which offers in-the-field training, whose regulations are valid in Italy and are set by law (24 June 1997 no. 196 art. 18 and the decree of 25 March 1998, no. 142). An internship is not a labour contract.

By law internships are not paid. At their discretion, companies can grant a monetary contribution that would go towards a student's studies.

Participation in internships

Internship opportunities in Italy and abroad are available through:

- Internship and Placement Announcements published online and reserved for Bocconi students;
- Arts and Culture International Program: program which offers internships with cultural institutions in Europe and around the world;
- Bocconi & Jobs: the semi-annual career fair allows Bocconi students to meet company representatives from all sectors;
- Company presentations in the University: companies present themselves and describe their programs for hiring potential candidates; the calendar for presentations is fixed every six months;
- Placement Library: the Career Service's library dedicated to the world of work. Students can organize the search and retrieval of information which is useful for finding internships and jobs.

These tools help to balance the supply and demand for internships. Securing an internship offer is not necessarily linked to academic qualifications. Companies decide on the desired curriculum and personal characteristics based on the contents of the educational project. During the internship, each student is supervised by both a company and University tutor.

Documents

The Internships Office of the Career Service is the contact point within the University that is responsible for formalizing the training experience (unless they are arranged by the International Internship Office (SRI), see next paragraph), regulating internships (agreements, training projects, and orientation) and providing the necessary documentation to ensure the training experience is recorded in the student's academic career.

Before starting an internship, students must collect the Educational and Orientation Project form at the Career Service Internship Office and give it to the host company or organization.

When the internship has finished, the host company will issue a certification stating that he/she has completed the internship. This form must be handed in personally to the Internship Office, together with a report and a final evaluation on the training experience completed.

3.6.2. International Internship with the International Relations Service

The International Relations Service (SRI) - International Internship Office of Università Bocconi offers 3 different international internship programs at institutions/organizations that are part of its network:

- International Organizations Program: Secretariat, agencies and field offices of the United Nations, the European Commission and other international institutions and non-government organizations throughout the world;
- Field Projects Program: Italian Chamber of Commerce abroad, companies active in international markets (excluding the European Union), and Foreign Consulates in Milan;
- Embassies Program: Ministry of Foreign Affairs in Rome and each Office abroad: Embassies, Consulates, Italian Cultural Institutes, Italian Permanent Representatives belonging to International institutions.

To find the institutions belonging to the network and internship opportunities check the website <u>http://www.ir.unibocconi.it/internship</u>.

Students can also find internships using their own channels. In this case, students must contact the International Internships Office (SRI) in order to have the contents assessed and to formalize the agreement. Students are advised to do this well in advance and in any case before starting the internship.

Students eligible for International Internship programs

The following may take part in international internship programs:

- students enrolled in their second year from the end of second year lessons for International Organizations (some institutions) and Field Projects Programs. Students must have obtained 60% of their first-year credit points;
- students enrolled in their third year (up to second-year repeating students ("fuori corso"), for the International Organizations (some institutions) and Field Projects Programs. Students must have completed their first-year exams and have earned 60% of their second-year credit points;
- **Bocconi graduates** up to 18 months after graduation, for International Organizations (some institutions), Embassies, and Field Projects.

Requirements

The requirements for taking part in the International Internship programs are:

- for all programs: knowledge of the foreign language required by the host institution;
- only for the Embassies Program: minimum graduation grade 105/110.

For further information about requirements see the website at http://www.ir.unibocconi.it/internship.

Documents

Students who would like to take part in the above programs must send the following documents in Word format (in one file) via email (international.internship@unibocconi.it) by the set deadlines:

- curriculum vitae and motivation letter in Italian (one for each institution you are applying for);
- curriculum vitae and motivation letter written in the language required by the institution (one for each institution you are applying for), except for the Embassies Program;

In order to complete the application, students must hand in the following items by the set deadlines:

- application form (to be collected from the International Internship Office or downloaded from <u>http://www.ir.unibocconi.it/internship</u>);
- copy of any language certifications;
- 1 passport photo, signed on the back;
- enrolment certification or unofficial academic transcript (printed at Punto Blu termials).

Only for the International Organizations Program students need:

• special forms from the individual institutions; ask at the International Internship Office (if required).

Only for the Embassies Program:

• copy of online application (<u>http://www.fondazionecrui.it/</u>).

After the International Internship Office has carried out the pre-selection based on language skills and also academic merit, student profiles are sent to the institutions which make the final decision. Students who withdraw from the internship or Exchange Program without good reason, according to an evaluation of the International Relations Service, are excluded from future pre-selections of all international internship programs (Field Projects, International Organizations and Embassies). If a student is excluded during undergraduate studies, this does not affect the student's eligibility to participate in these programs during graduate studies. Furthermore, for one month no other internship is allowed, even if the student organizes his/her own.

Periods and deadlines

Internship opportunities organized by the International Internships Office of the International Relations Service are promoted in the International Internships bulletin published on the website at http://www.ir.unibocconi.it/internship.

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3.7. In-Company Training

In-Company Training projects are designed to provide students with professional guidance.

The project offers small groups of students (between 15 to 30 participants) the chance to spend a training period lasting between 2 to 5 days with a company.

Participants take part in diversified activities and initiatives. The main objectives are to increase understanding of business and process dynamics, deepen knowledge of functional areas and improve transversal skills. Generally, projects are structured in two parts: a theoretical part (company presentations, company functions, seminars, testimonies) and a practical part (business games, company visits, group assignments); contents are agreed upon with the company.

The Career Service promotes the realization of In-Company Training projects both in Italy and abroad in collaboration with different types of public and private companies: industrialists, commercialists, service providers, credit, finance and insurance institutions, consulting and auditing firms, professional studios as well as public authorities, institutions and associations.

If the organisation is located outside of the local area then Università Bocconi provides participants with a contribution to cover part of board, lodging and travel expenses.

On completion of the project, students are requested to write and submit a report prior to receiving the certificate of participation.

In-Company Training projects are included in the "other relevant elements in the student's academic career" for the purpose of calculating graduation grades (see paragraph 6.2.5 "Awarding of the graduation grade").

3.8.1. Supplementary activities registration via yoU@B student diary

The offer for 2007-2008 a.y. is published in September (before the start dates of any activity initiatives); more detailed information including programs and calendars will be released on the websites of the services sector which offer these activities.

The general rules for supplementary activities are set out below:

- sign-up application procedure: through the yoU@B student diary during 2 periods:
 - from 19 to 30 September 2007 for I semester activities;
 - from 10 to 25 January 2008 for II semester activities.

When signing up students can choose up to 3 choices (max) in decreasing order of preference. Students can also indicate if they intend taking just 1 of the 3 indicated or if they intend to take 2 (if it is possible to assign everyone a course and there are still places available);

- **assigning courses**: sign-up applications are accepted on the basis of academic merit, GPA and credits recorded in the academic career. In the II semester priority is given to students who missed out on their preferences or who did not apply in I semester. Once the ranking has been drawn up, students are assigned their first, second or third choices, in that order, depending on whether there are places available. After all students in the ranking have been assigned an activity, where possible, the same criteria are applied to assigning a second to those who have requested one, and if there are any places left. Students who are admitted/not admitted to attend these activities will receive a personal online message sent to their yoU@B student diary;
- **attendance:** obligatory for at least 75% of the teaching sessions, as established by the instructors. Students who attend less than 50% without good reason (e.g. medical certificate), will be excluded from future editions of these activities for the whole academic year as well as the following academic year; this exclusion also applies to online courses which have mechanisms for registering attendance, if offered;
- evaluation: is carried out by instructors according to the assessment methods discussed in class (e.g. written report) but is subordinate to the compulsory 75% attendance;
- **period of study:** courses are held during teaching periods and on specific dates which are finalized before the sign-up period begins;
- duration: a minimum of 5 teaching sessions of 2 hours each.

4. EDUCATIONAL ACTIVITIES

4.1. Lessons

Class activities

One credit point corresponds to 8 hours of lessons; a maximum of 2 additional hours of

complementary learning activities can be added; these complementary learning activities include practical exercises and other class activities that do not add new topics to the course content.

Attendance

Attendance at lessons is not compulsory however it is strongly recommended since it meets the proposed educational model designed to favor gradual learning, active participation of students in class and the creation of a dialog between students and teachers.

For some courses the assessment methods may be different for attending and non attending students.

4.2. Class groups

Educational activities are organized into class groups for compulsory courses, for the 2007-2008 a.y. each class group is made up of around 150 students.

For the 2007-2008 a.y. 19 class groups have been scheduled for third-year students as follows:

Each class group is assigned a specific classroom. All students belonging to the same class group follow the lessons in their assigned classroom and have the same teachers.

To facilitate educational activities planning (class group numbers and classroom capacity) students cannot change their assigned class group.

The class groups remain the same for the entire academic year.

For third-year students the class groups for compulsory courses are assigned when they enrol in the new academic year at Punto Blu terminals (from 1 August to 10 September 2007). For undergraduate programs with multiple class groups the composition of the class group changes in order to provide students with the opportunity of working with as many students as possible from the degree program.

Third-year elective class groups are assigned before lessons begin except when students cannot be allocated either the first or second choice electives (see paragraph 7.1.5 dedicated to choice of

electives).

4.2.1. E-learning class group

The educational offer for the 2007-2008 academic year includes an e-learning class group for some elective courses already taught in the same semester with traditional methods.

Traditional educational activities in the e-learning class groups are replaced by the participation in specific on-line activities, both asynchronous (i.e. students' individual activities) and synchronous (i.e. videoconference).

On-line activities are set and scheduled by the Course Director. They may include, for instance:

- on-line consultation of specific material (slides, documents etc.);
- participation in on-line forums;
- drafting of electronic documents, both individually and with other students, which may be based on material available on-line;
- participation in synchronous activities with teachers and other students. Such activities may consist in debates or question and answer periods regarding course subjects, on-line real-time exercises/on-line lessons etc.

Recipients

Since e-learning is the only opportunity which allows students to participate virtually in the course, this method provides new services and options compatible with the mobility required to study abroad and/or to take part in internships in Italy and/or abroad.

Such learning methods are offered only to students unable to attend lessons regularly; however, the traditional methods have preference and are recommended by the University since they are the most effective.

Choice of Method

For method of choice see chapter 7.1.5

Course profiles and exam assessment methods

Traditional and e-learning course profiles are identical. However due to different teaching approaches, teachers can diversify supplementary exercises and/or other related activities by offering e-learning students alternate activities.

The exams are held at the university, following traditional methods (see chapter 5); the exam calendar is the same for the two class groups. Distance exams are not offered by the university.

Students enrolled in e-learning class groups can take partial exams, if available.

For information relating to credit points, language of instruction, semester, and Degree Programs offering these courses please check course profiles pubblished on the web site <u>www.unibocconi.it/profiles</u>.

4.2.2. Repeat class groups

Some courses may have repeat class groups for students who are behind normal academic progress, that is, students who have not yet passed their exams of previous year. These students must attend lessons in the class group dedicated to them.

For the course profile and information concerning the teaching methodology applied in repeat class groups, students are recommended to follow the instructions given by teachers. In addition, each Institute has a secretary's office where students can obtain information about the details of these courses (for example, course profile, assessment methods, student office hours).

Students who intend to take these courses must choose the class group they want to join as long as there are still places available.

The list of such classes together with any sign-up methods (extra activity code, sign-up deadlines and number of places available) will be posted on the "General Notices" bulletin board, which is located on the ground floor of the University building at via Sarfatti 25, and will also be published on the Internet site <u>http://www.unibocconi.it/classtimetable</u>.

If registration is required, students may consult the <u>voU@B</u> student diary for a list of activities. Those students who have been admitted to these classes will receive a personalized message in their <u>voU@B</u> student diary.

When no repeat class groups are scheduled, students who are behind normal academic progress may, with prior approval of teachers, attend the lessons and sit the partial exams for the regular class groups. In these cases you should contact the secretary's office of the Institute responsible for the course for more information.

4.3. Class timetable The timetable for all degree programs is structured in the same way and assigns specific time slots to the following educational activities:

- compulsory courses;
- elective courses;
- foreign languages.

This arrangement ensures that compulsory lessons, elective lessons and language lessons do not clash with each other.

In addition, there may also be some complementary lessons scheduled which aim to review some of the concepts dealt with during the normal teaching sessions. In general, they are held at different times from lessons (in the evening from 6pm to 7:30pm).

No educational activities are scheduled from 1pm-2:30pm on Fridays, both in the first and in the second semester timetable, this period being reserved for student group activities.

The general class timetable is published on the University's Internet site <u>http://www.unibocconi.it/classtimetable</u>.

The class timetable and any changes are posted on the bulletin boards, which are located on the ground floor of the University buildings at piazza Sraffa 13 and via Sarfatti 25. In via Sarfatti 25 students can also find the bulletin board for foreign languages.

After students have enrolled in the academic year, they can view and print the personalized class timetable from both Punto Blu terminals and <u>yoU@B</u>. At Punto Blu terminals students can see the personalized class timetable for current semester only.

The following outlines the commencement of lessons for the 2007-2008 a.y.:

first semester

second semester

• 18 February 2008.

Please note that language and elective course lessons begin on 17 September 2007 in the first semester and on 18 February 2008 in the second semester, as for all other courses.

In addition, the <u>voU@B</u> student diary allows students to integrate their personalized class timetable with other educational activities that interest them and to view and print all the other information recorded in their diary for the desired period (daily, weekly, monthly,etc).

4.5. Office hours

During office hours students have the opportunity to consult teachers. This gives students the chance to seek further explanations or clarifications of the topics that were not fully understood during lessons. 4.6. Tutors

There are 2 types of tutor assistance offered to students:

- course level assistance this type of tutoring includes correction of exercises assigned as homework, case studies, completion of projects and management of the online community; in addition, it could also involve lectures that require the use of software;
- interdisciplinary level assistance it provides students with guidance and support to ensure that they can be actively involved in the studying process during the whole degree program.

For information about courses and tutor activities (names of tutors, office hours and rooms) see the "Tutors" bulletin board located on the ground floor of the University building at via Sarfatti 25.

4.7. Evaluation

Bocconi uses a detailed evaluation system designed to check the teaching quality which involves the student's direct active input. Main activities include:

- checks carried out through "class group representatives", appointed to represent the entire class group by liaising with the teacher, acting as their spokesperson in presenting their observations and suggestions and outlining any difficulties that may arise during the lessons. The role of class group representatives is to create an environment which favors more interaction between teachers and students. In fact, the Course Director is invited to periodically meet with these students, and at the end of the semester, discuss with them the general outcome of the course and if needed, the results of the evaluation;
- evaluation of the university experience through questionnaires is arranged at specific points during the degree program, including:

- **mid-semester evaluation** (so called "mid-term evaluation") is carried out voluntarily by students at the teacher's request, aimed at gathering information on the teaching quality and course progress and shedding light on any problems in a timely fashion which allows corrective action to be implemented before the end of the course;

- **end-semester evaluation** is carried out close to end of lessons; it involves all teachers and courses in the program structure including foreign language and computer skills;

- **evaluation of assessment methods** is carried out every two years to gather information on students' impressions regarding the efficiency and fairness of the procedures used to test the students' preparation; this is carried out by completing an online questionnaire, available during the academic year on the <u>voU@B</u> diary;

- evaluation of the overall university experience questionnaire, is a systematic assessment concerning students about to complete their studies, aimed at gathering information on the quality and effectiveness of the course study, on the study experience and on the main support services (Career Service, ISU Student Assistance and Financial Aid, International Relations Service). Also in this case the questionnaire is completed online via the <u>voU@B</u> diary and it is made available to graduating students around one month before the

deadline for making the graduation reservation.

5. EXAMS

Assessment methods such as exams and other types of tests are designed to evaluate whether students have reached the required level of preparation in order to be awarded the relative credit points for the various educational activities. Exams and assessment items are marked out of thirty or given a pass or fail grade and they are always individual.

5.1. Exam program

Exams, like lessons, are based on the topics described in the course program that is available in 2 versions: the course profile and the course syllabus.

The course profile includes the main topics dealt with in the course and is divided into 4 distinct sections: Course Objectives, Course Content Summary, Textbooks and Detailed Description of Assessment Methods. Students can access the course profiles on the Bocconi Internet site at http://www.unibocconi.it/profiles where students can read, print or save the profiles on file by following the indications given on the site. To help students in choosing courses on the basis of the course contents, the course profiles are published on the site well before the start of lessons. Substantial variations to the course profiles are not envisaged during the year, except for some changes to the textbooks that may be made as a consequence of new publications or updated material that were not available when the profile was finalized.

The purpose of thecourse syllabus together with the information published online is to explain in more detail the topics covered. For every learning session of the course, if possible the reference materials necessary for an in-depth appreciation and consolidation of the concepts dealt with or referred to in lessons and assessment methods are specified and tutors are available (see 4.6). The course syllabus is prepared by the Course Directors in conjunction with the views of the Program Director. The syllabus is generally distributed during lessons and is also available from the secretary's office of the Institute responsible for the course.

5.2. Assessment methods

The assessment methods are indicated in a summarized form in the course profiles and are explained in further detail in the course syllabuses. In addition, they are also explained by the teachers during lectures and indicated in the notices issued by the secretary's office of the Institute responsible for the course.

The assessment methods may be different for attending and non-attending students. Furthermore, some exams can only be taken by attending students.

Exams may be entirely written or entirely oral or a combination of a written exam with either an obligatory or optional oral part.

Students are considered "attending" if they fulfil the course attendance requirements established by the teacher.

Generally the exam assessment methods include partial exams (one or more) and/or a single general exam.

Partial exams are not compulsory, although they are strongly recommended.

The results of partial exams are taken into account to pass the complete exam and to be awarded the relative credit points; passing two partial exams can, if the assessment methods allow, be equivalent to passing the general exam.

Oral exams are open to the public, while for written exams (either general or partial exams) students are guaranteed the right to inspect their exam paper, which they are advised to do before the mark is registered.

Courses that are organized in modules may include assessment at the end of each module, although credit points are not awarded for each single module. Credit points are awarded for the whole course only when students have completed all the programmed modules.

For courses with multi-class groups in the same undergraduate program, the exams are organized in the same way. For undergraduate programs taught in Italian and English, written exams are presented both in Italian and English so that students can choose the version which corresponds to the class group they attended.

It is important to always check how exam marks are registered either with the teacher or with the secretary's office of the Institute (whether or not it is necessary to register for other exams to complete the requirement, etc.) and to check the expiration date of the mark of those written exams that are followed by an oral exam.

5.3. Past exam papers

The Course Director will decide on the availability of past exam papers, together with the correct answers. If a Course Director decides to distribute past exam papers, a copy is placed in either the University bookshop or in the secretarys office of the Institute.

Students can photocopy this material on presentation of their Bocconi ID card (which must be left as a deposit while they make copies).

Past exam papers which are released are available for 12 months, unless otherwise stipulated by the Course Director.

5.4. Period of general/partial exams and timetable

5.4.1. General and partial exams

The exam timetable is organized in periods that do not coincide with the periods when lessons are held. Each exam period consists of one or more sessions.

The exam timetable (October 2007 - September 2008) allocates 7 exam sessions for all courses and when necessary also include partial exams.

Students can take exams in all sessions as long as they satisfy the attendance requirements (semester lessons of the course included in the study plan must be finished).

Lessons are suspended at mid-semester in both the first and second semester for 1st partial exams. 2nd partial exams are held at the end of the semester of lessons (1st semester course exams are held after the Christmas holidays).

The dates of partial exams may or may not coincide with the dates fixed for general exams.

The exam periods and exam sessions (reference period: October 2007 - September 2008) for all second and third-year undergraduates are scheduled as follows:

Note

- "Session" refers to both the exams of the current year and the previous years;
- for those students:

- participating in the Exchange and Free-Mover Programs abroad in the 2nd semester 2007-2008 a.y.

- participating in the Campus Abroad (winter)
- incoming 1st semester (exchange, single courses for visiting students)

there is an early session scheduled during the 10 to 21 December 2007 period prior to the January 2008 session.

Please note that the above students cannot sit exams for previous year's courses in such period.

There is NO overlapping between compulsory course exam sessions of the same year, undergraduate degree program; therefore no two exams on the same day are usually scheduled. The overlapping rule refers only to courses of the year in which the student is enrolled and do not refer to previous years' exams which have not been passed yet.

5.4.2. Exam timetable

The exam timetable for the October 2007 - September 2008 period is published in the second half of September on the University Internet site at <u>http://www.unibocconi.it/examtimetable</u>.

During the year the timetable of an exam session may be changed (only to a later date or time), in which case students do not need to re-register for the exam since their registration is automatically transferred to the new timetable.

Exam dates are updated daily on the Internet site, so that if the timetable is changed, the new date or time is displayed and students may check the original timetable of the exam session by clicking on the

relative exam icons.

Changes to the exam timetable are displayed on the "Exam timetable changes" bulletin board located on the ground floor of the University building in via Sarfatti 25.

Personalized exam timetables can be printed at Punto Blu terminals and from the <u>voU@B</u> student diary, which can be accessed from the Bocconi homepage. Via <u>voU@B</u> students can integrate their personalized exam timetable with the deadlines of other educational activities or personal interest activities, and organize and print all the information recorded in their diary for the desired period (daily, weekly, monthly, etc).

The different types of exams are identified in the exam timetable by the following letters:

- PI Partial exam
- S Written exam
- O Oral exam

5.4.3. Classroom allocation

The list of classrooms assigned for exams is generally published in the afternoon of the working day prior to the exam date, on the Internet site at <u>http://www.unibocconi.it/classrooms</u>.

They are also posted daily:

- on the ground floor of the University building in via Sarfatti 25 on the "Today's exams and activities" bulletin board;
- on the ground floor of the University building in piazza Sraffa 13, on the monitors and on the bulletin boards.

Students can also check exam dates and classroom allocations by mobile phone using the SMS Bocconi service.

5.4.4. Student allocation If a **breakdown of students in the classrooms** is necessary for exams and partial exams this is displayed online on the student's <u>voU@B</u> diary; the subdivision is displayed on the bulletin boards "Exams - breakdown of students", located on the ground floor of the University buildings in via Sarfatti 25 and piazza Sraffa13.

5.5. Exam and partial exam registration procedure

Registration for exams (written, oral, partial) can be carried out at Punto Blu terminals or via <u>Virtual</u> <u>Punto Blu</u> by the fourth from the last working day before the exam itself. Students can also register for exams by mobile phone using the <u>SMS Bocconi service</u>.

The following days and periods are classified as non-working days and therefore are not included:

- Saturdays and Sundays;
- Holidays and periods when the University is closed, as indicated below:
- for 2007: 1 and 2 November, 7 December, from 24 to 31 December;
- for 2008 (up to the September period): 1 January, 24 March, 2 June.

To register for exams and partial exams students must have paid the first instalment of the university fees and tuition and have no academic penalties.

To register, select IP exam registration: a list of the un-passed courses included in the study plan appears (excluding computer skills, see 3.4). Students should select the type of exam they want to register for (\mathbf{O} = oral; \mathbf{S} = written; \mathbf{I} = partial exam). It is possible to register or cancel for the current date (first date available for that type of exam) or for the next date (second date available for that same type of exam), however, it is not possible to register for both at the same time. If general exams (O or S) are on the same day as partial exams (one date only), students must choose between the exam types as it is not possible to register for both at the same time. If the exam timetable shows both a date for the written exam and a date for the oral exam students must register for both of them (even if they are on the same day). **If students do not register for both of them, they cannot sit the exam**.

In some cases when registering for an exam students will be asked to make a specific choice from among a group of alternatives ('registration to the groups') for example, "attending students" or "partial exam instead of general exam", etc). After selecting the type and date of exam for which they want to register/cancel, a window will automatically appear giving students the possibility of selecting the group they want to register for.

The registration/cancellation operation is carried out only if all confirmation prompts asked for by the system are given. If confirmation is not given, registration for the specific activity will NOT take place.

It is possible to display and print the operations carried out for all active exams (that is for the next exam scheduled at the transaction date) at Punto Blu terminals. In addition, students can display all the operations carried out over the last 90 days, including information regarding exams that have already been held.

If the system does not allow you to register for or cancel from an exam, it may be as a result of one of

the following:

- the registration deadline has passed;
- the course is not included in the study plan;
- the exam has already been passed;
- the student is suspended for non-payment of university fees and tuition;
- the student does not have the right to sit the exam because the exam is scheduled before lessons finish (end of semester); this does not apply to partial exams.

When the registration to the session has closed, the above criteria will be checked again. If the criteria has not been met the student cannot sit the exam. Students who are suspended after registering for one or more exams and/or partial exams are sent a message on their yoU@B student diary and via SMS informing them that they cannot sit the exam. Students who clear up their position before registration closes have the right to sit the exam. Once students clear up their position they will receive a message via the above channels.

5.6. Examining boards

Examining boards are appointed by the Rector or one of his delegates and consist of at least 2 members, including a President, and are presided over by the Course Director. When necessary, exam commissions may be divided into sub-examining boards.

Examining professors include: the Course Director and the official course teaching team, as indicated in the annual teaching activities program, together with those experts in the subject who have the necessary qualifications and have been proposed by the Course Director.

Students will generally sit exams with the teacher(s) of their assigned class group if they take the exam in the first exam period after the end of the course. In successive exam sessions, exams may also be organized in various class groups, in which case student may sit exams with either a teacher or teachers of one of the class groups, or with an expert in the subject. The class groups may not be the same that were assigned to the students.

5.7. Exam procedure

5.7.1. Procedure

Students must come to exams equipped with:

- unofficial academic transcript;
- Bocconi ID card;
- valid proof of identity document (e.g. identity card).

Students must sign in to certify their presence at the exam (this does not refer to mark acceptance). For written exams, students certify their presence by signing the exam paper.

For oral exams, students certify their presence by signing the appropriate documents used to register the exam mark.

During exams students may decide to withdraw, in which case their papers are not considered valid and the exam result is not registered.

For written exams students are deemed to have withdrawn if they hand in their exam papers with "withdrawn" written on them; for oral exams, students may only withdraw before the teacher declares the mark. Withdrawing from an exam is equivalent to not taking the exam.

Handing in written exam papers (whether they are partial or general exams) means accepting the mark the teacher gives the paper, no matter what it is.

5.7.2. Exam conduct

Exams are official assessments which must be taken in full compliance with the rules. During an examination students:

- cannot offer or receive any assistance from students or any other party, nor can they use notes unless authorized by the teacher;
- cannot attempt to obtain confidential information about the specific questions of the exam;
- cannot assume the identity of another nor allow others to assume their identity during an exam; nor can students present as their own a piece of work which has been copied, entirely or partially.

Violation of the above rules or the instructions given by the teacher during exams, is cause for cancellation of the exam, and the start of disciplinary procedures. The disciplinary sanctions applied in this University include:

- official warning;
- temporary ban from one or more courses;
- exclusion from one or more exams for one or two sessions;
- temporary suspension from the University and loss of exam sessions (not more than three years).

All disciplinary sanctions are registered in the student's scholastic records, written in the transfer form, and in all university documents used in determining the student's graduation mark. A disciplinary sanction more serious than a warning precludes any benefits (scholarships, housing etc.).

These rules do not substitute the university in the monitoring of the exams. The university will maintain strict exam procedures. At least one teacher will be physically present at each exam. The university moreover will do its best to ensure that the exams are taken in adequate rooms, with enough space and silence to allow students to concentrate. Teachers are required to set clear questions and to mark exams following clear rules, allowing students to show their ability and degree of understanding of the subject area.

5.8. Marks

A mark of between 0 and 17 out of thirty is considered **unsatisfactory**. A mark of between 18 and 30 out of thirty is considered **satisfactory**. The examining board may award "lode" (cum laude) to students who obtain thirty out of thirty (30/30).

Exams that are awarded a satisfactory mark are considered to have been passed and cannot be retaken (whether they are partial exams or general exams). Exams that are awarded an unsatisfactory mark are considered to have been failed and must therefore be taken again.

5.9. Publication of exam results

The results of written exams are available from the secretary's office of the Institute responsible for the courses and are also generally published on the Bocconi Internet site, where they can be accessed via the <u>voU@B</u> student diary. **The marks posted on the bulletin boards and displayed in the <u>voU@B</u> student diary are for informational purposes only**. Once the result of an exam has been registered, students are advised to check that it has been correctly recorded in their academic career by using the "Certification" menu at Punto Blu terminals.

In addition, results are also sent via the SMS Bocconi service.

5.10. Recording, registering and certifying

The final results of exams are recorded with a mark out of thirty and are registered in the student's academic career by the Student Administration Centre.

Each student's "Official academic" transcript contains all the exams included in the study plan, together with the date when the exam was passed, the marks and the credit points awarded for the exams that have been recorded.

The unofficial academic transcript contains all exams, including those that have been passed, that is the exams for which students have been awarded a sufficient mark.

Only passed exams are certificated.

5.11. Credit for foreign languages and computer skills international certifications

For the first and second foreign language courses, a list of international language certifications (the mark will be converted into a mark out of thirty) are recognized as an alternative to Bocconi exams.

For more detailed information about this see chapter 3.3.

For the computer skills course, student evaluation is based on the "ECDL start" certification. The marks achieved will be converted into a mark out of thirty. For more detailed information about this see chapter 3.4.

5.12. How to calculate the Grade Point Average (GPA)

The Grade Point Average (GPA) is calculated by the mathematical average weighted on the credit point values of all courses with marks expressed out of thirty recorded in the student's academic career.

Exams that have been awarded "lode"(cum laude) are given the value 31.

A maximum of 2 additional exams can be included in the calculation of the GPA. If a student has passed more than 2 additional exams, the 2 best results are considered.

The exams ratified for students transferring from other Italian universities are assigned the mark

awarded by the University where the exam was originally taken.

The exams ratified for students transferring from universities abroad are assigned the mark awarded by the University where the exam was originally taken. If the original marks are expressed in different numerical scales or in letters, they are converted to marks out of thirty on the basis of the specific conversion table.

The exams taken at other universities that have an agreement with Università Bocconi are assigned the mark awarded by the University where the exam was originally taken. If the original marks are expressed in different numerical scales or in letters, they are converted to marks out of thirty on the basis of the specific conversion table.

5.13. Exam sequence

Exam sequence indicates the sequence that must be followed in terms of time and prerequisites in preparing exams and obliges students to pass some exams before sitting for others.

There is no pre-ordered sequence in sitting the exams of programs, however students are advised to sit exams following the sequence of the teaching activities for the current academic year and semester.

5.14. Credit for exams passed at universities abroad

Students enrolled in undergraduate programs may obtain credit for exams (marks and credit points) taken abroad as part of the following programs which are promoted and coordinated by the International Relations Service: International Exchange, Free-Mover Semester, Campus Abroad(*) and Free-Mover Summer Program.

Please note:

- with reference to these periods abroad, students can receive credit for a maximum of 4 recognised exams; not more than 4 in the Exchange Program, not more than 3 in the Free-Mover Semester Program and not more than 1 in the Free-Mover Summer Program;
- students who take part in the Exchange Program cannot also take part in the Free-Mover Semester Program, and vice versa, since it is not possible to accumulate 2 semesters abroad;
- credit can be granted for both compulsory and elective exams, either in full or after integration of part of the program, on the following conditions:
 - compulsory courses: students cannot receive credit for the courses listed on the Internet

site at http://www.unibocconi.it/exams in "List of exams for which credit cannot be granted if taken abroad". In addition, they cannot receive credit for foreign languages and computer skills courses taken at universities abroad. However, students can receive credit for international certificates for foreign language and computer skills recognised by Università Bocconi acquired during study abroad. These certificates do not count towards the maximum credit limits for the international programs context;

- **elective courses**: all exams that correspond to elective courses offered by Università Bocconi can be sat abroad. In addition, for the Exchange Program, only in special cases, students can receive credit for exams that correspond to elective courses without a Bocconi equivalent (for more information see 5.14.1).

(*) Exams passed as part of the Campus Abroad Program do not come under the "Credit for exams passed at universities abroad" section, as they are Bocconi courses.

Credit approval procedure for exams taken as part of Exchange, Free-Mover Semester and Free-Mover Summer Programs

Gaining credit for exams taken as part of the Exchange, Free-Mover Semester and Free-Mover Summer Programs is not usually automatic and depends on the following credit approval procedure. In order to obtain approval, students seeking credit must present the course program **before departure** to the Course Director of the corresponding Bocconi course.

If the elective courses do not correspond to any courses offered by Università Bocconi, students must apply to the Program Director or one of his/her delegates **before departure**. This refers to the Exchange Program only and is limited to particular cases.

To start the credit approval procedure students should contact the International Relations Office who will receive the academic transcript from the host university abroad. Based on this document and **the student's request**, the "**Summarized credit approval report**" and "**Individual exam report**" will be prepared. These will be used for exam conversion together with the "**mark conversion table**". Students can go to the Course Director of the Bocconi equivalent course (or the Program Direct or his/her delegate for courses that do not have a Bocconi equivalent) with the "**Summarized credit approval report**" and "**Individual exam report**" in order to have the exam mark recorded. Exam registration via Punto Blu or Virtual Punto Blu is not necessary.

The Course Director (or the Program Director or his/her delegate) will send the "Individual exam report" to the Student Administration Centre.

Once this process has been completed students will hand in once again the "**Summarized credit approval report**" to the International Relations Office. They will then go to the Teaching Services and Organization Desk to make any elective course changes that have not yet been included in the study plan.

The normal credit approval procedure does not apply to some courses (indicated on the Internet site at <u>http://www.ir.unibocconi.it/exchange</u>). These courses are automatically recognized. Therefore, it is not necessary to submit the course profile **before departure** to the Course Director or Program Director or one of his/her delegates. Nor is it necessary to submit the individual exam report to have the course

registered.

5.14.2. Registration of exams taken as part of the Campus Abroad Program

Credit is granted for all exams taken as part of the Campus Abroad Program. On completion of the program, the International Relations Office sends a list of students who have passed exams with the relative marks to the Student Administration Centre. The course is automatically registered in the student's academic career, as long as it conforms to the program structure regulations.

6. FINAL PAPER AND GRADUATION

6.1. Final paper

6.1.1. Contents of the final paper

The **final paper** is a concise paper written in either Italian or English (DIEM students must write it in English). It develops a topic which may be purely theoretical or supported by empirical evidence, taking as a starting point work experience (internships) or study periods in Italy or abroad (preferably abroad for DIEM students).

For the program requirements of:

- CLEA, CLAPI, CLEFIN, CLELI, CLEACC, DES, CLEMIT the final paper is worth 6 credit points;
- DIEM the final paper is worth 10 credit points;
- CLSG the final paper is worth 4 credit points.

As a general guide, the paper is around 30 pages and may require about one month of work.

The **contents** of the final paper must be related to one of the subject areas of the Università Bocconi Institutes. However, it does not necessarily have to be related to one of the courses in the student's study plan.

Final papers are written under the supervision of a tutor.

If students want to base their final papers on either an internship or a period of study abroad, the tutor and student must agree on the topic **before the student starts to write the final paper**.

The final paper preparation stages are the following:

- orientation;
- final paper reservation (if required by the Institute);
- assignment;
- cancellation;
- submission.

6.1.2. Orientation

Every Institute offers a **Final Paper Service (SOLF - Servizio Orientamento Lavoro Finale)** which is responsible for:

- coordinating orientation activities for students on possible topics for final papers and teachers who are available as tutors;
- supervising the IT procedure for final papers.

The online orientation application is available on the website at <u>http://www.unibocconi.it/solf</u>, where students can also see the names of SOLF contact teachers.

6.2. Graduation

6.2.1. Reservation and assignment of the final paper

Some Institutes manage both the **reservation** and **assignment phases** of final papers online. Students can **reserve** the final papers through the IT procedure. All those final papers that have been reserved will not be available for other students.

Alternatively, some Institutes opt for direct contact with students because they do not offer online reservation, and as a consequence the registration of final papers is part of the assignment phase.

The formal **assignment** of final papers can take place only after students have enrolled in the third year of studies.

6.2.2. Submission of the final paper

This phase is divided into 3 parts:

- the <u>approval form</u> is given by the tutor and the abstract is defined;
- the approval form and abstract are uploaded into the IT procedure;
- the final paper is uploaded into the IT procedure.

Once the final paper has been finished, students can go to their tutors in order to collect the receipt for final paper approval and to agree upon the contents of the abstract. 2 copies of the receipt are issued and students should keep one copy for themselves.

The other copy is used to enter the tutor approval into the IT system, and includes a section for the contents of the abstract. Each Institute decides whether the approval form and abstract are inserted into the IT procedure by the tutor or by SOLF. In the first case, the tutor keeps the second copy of the approval form and enters the abstract directly into the procedure. In the second case, students hand in the other copy of the approval form, together with the text of the abstract, to SOLF.

Lastly, final papers must be formatted as pdf files (according to the format specifications) and must be uploaded into the IT system; each Institute decides whether the uploading will be done by the tutor when the approval form is completed/submitted, or by SOLF.

Submission is considered to be final. Once the final paper has been submitted, no requests for any modifications of any type will be accepted.

The deadlines for submitting final papers are indicated on the Graduation Calendar.

Each Institute sets the maximum period of time from assignment to submission; this period cannot be greater than 6 months.

6.2.2.1. Format Specifications

Instructions for the submission of the Final Report to SOLF Secretaries

- 1. The Final Report must be submitted to SOLF in electronic format on disk or CD-ROM.
- 2. If the Final Report size is less than 1.44 MB it can be submitted on disk (floppy) or CD-ROM. If the Final Report size is greater than 1.44 MB it **must only be submitted on CD-ROM**.
- 3. The Final Report must be submitted in **one complete file only in PDF format**, and the name of the file is LF followed by the student ID e.g. if the student ID is 1234567 the name of the file is LF1234567.PDF
- 4. Students must attach a **label** to the disk (floppy), or to the CD-ROM cover, including, clearly printed and in BLOCK LETTERS: student ID, surname/family name and name.
- 5. Students, in addition to the electronic copy of the Final Report submitted to SOLF, may by request of the tutor; have to submit to the same tutor a printed or electronic copy of the Final Report.

If students have to submit a **printed copy** of their Final Report they must respect the following formatting specifications:

- Paper size: cm 29x21 (A4)
- Lines per page: from 26 to 30 lines
- Recommended font: Arial/Tahoma/Verdana
- Font size (body):12 points
- Pages numbered
- Cover sheet including: student ID, surname/family name, name, undergraduate degree, final report title and tutor

It is not possible to use the Università Bocconi seal on the cover sheet or within the Final Report.

6.2.3. Cancelling the final paper

Final papers may be cancelled by SOLF:

- if students request so;
- if the allotted time for the assignment has expired.

6.2.4. Graduation Reservation

Students can make the graduation reservation via Punto Blu or Virtual Punto Blu by reserving a graduation session from the <u>Graduation Calendar</u>. Students can sit exams during this period. **Students do not need to have passed all exams in order to make the graduation reservation**. Therefore they are reminded to apply **before** submitting their final papers.

When making the graduation reservation, the system will check online that both the student's financial and administrative positions comply with the graduation session. Third-year students enrolled in the 2006-2007 a.y. who intend to graduate:

- by the graduation session of **December 2007**, are not obliged to enrol in the 2007-2008 a.y.;
- in the **1st** graduation session after **December 2007**, are obliged to enrol in the 2007-2008 a.y. and to pay the 1st installment of University fees and tuition;
- in the **2nd** graduation session after **December 2007**, are obliged to enrol in the 2007-2008 a.y. and to pay the **1st and 2nd installments** of University fees and tuition;
- from the **3rd** graduation session after **December 2007** on, are obliged to enrol in the 2007-2008 a.y. and pay the **total amount** of university fees and tuition.

Third-year students enrolled in the 2007-2008 a.y. who intend to graduate by the graduation session of **December 2008** are not obliged to enrol in the 2008-2009 a.y.

In addition, the system also checks that students:

- have been assigned a final paper title in the SOLF system;
- have paid the graduation fee (using the MAV payment slip sent by the University to the permanent or temporary address);
- have valid qualifications for admission to the University.

Students must also declare that:

- they do not have any pending obligations with ISU;
- they will not have any outstanding obligations with the Library by the end of the graduation session.

The application to graduate allows students to:

- view the titles of their final papers;
- make any changes in their temporary addresses (i.e. the address where the degree diploma, the DVD of the Graduation Ceremony and the Diploma Supplement should be sent if the graduate is not present at the Graduation Ceremony.)

All "educational activities not expressed as a mark out of thirty and all other elements in the students academic career" are registered automatically in the "Student's Academic Career" database and will be placed in the graduation folder. Therefore, students do not have to hand in any documents to the Student Administration Centre.

Students are asked to fill in the following forms in the vol@B student diary by the set deadline :

- the placement form, which is available one day after the graduation reservation has been made, which goes into a "CV Book". Following graduation this CV Book will be sent to Bocconi contacts which include companies, public and private organizations as well as professional studios, with the aim of enhancing recruitment opportunities;
- the evaluation of university experience questionnaire, that forms part of a nation-wide survey aimed at gathering feedback on university study from graduating students. The survey is made available after the graduation reservation has been made, i.e. one month before the deadline for making the graduation reservation.

Once the period for making the graduation reservation has ended, the Student Administration Centre will verify that:

- the final paper has been uploaded into the system;
- all educational activities provided for in the student's study plan have been recorded in the academic career (with the exception of the credit points relative to the final paper);
- students do not have any pending obligations with ISU;
- students do not have any outstanding obligations with the Library.

Students will receive notification of acceptance to graduation via an online message sent to their <u>voU@B</u> student diaries. This message will also contain the student's GPA and score for educational activities not expressed out of 30.

Final papers will be submitted to the Examining Board for assessment only if all of the criteria to graduate are fulfilled.

If students for any reason wish to withdraw from the reserved graduation session, they have to cancel their graduation reservation by handing in the renouncement in writing to the Teaching Services and Organization Desk. In order to graduate in a later graduation session they must re-submit the graduation reservation within the time-frame provided for by the <u>Graduation Calendar</u>.

After reserving a graduation session students can no longer enrol in the new academic year unless they cancel the graduation session that they have reserved. This must be done by handing in the renouncement in writing to the Teaching Services and Organization Desk.

Students can submit another graduation reservation after they have re-enrolled in the new academic year and paid all fees and tuition.

6.2.5. Awarding of the graduation grade

The graduation grade is awarded by the Examining Board. Students are not required to make an oral dissertation of their final paper.

The Examining Boards are appointed by the Rector or by his delegates, and are presided over by a tenured professor. The Boards are comprised of professors, researchers and experts in the subject of the final paper.

The Boards are made up of at least 4 members, shared out as follows: 3 teachers from the Institute which has handled with the final papers, one of them takes the President role, and a teacher extraneous to the Institute.

Calculation of the graduation grade:

• Grade Point Average, weighted on the credit point values and converted into a mark out of 110, of all the "educational activities with marks expressed out of 30" which are foreseen in the study plan,

to which is added:

- from 0 to 4 points (out of 110) for the assessment of the "quality of the final paper";
- from 0 to 2 points (out of 110) for the "time required to graduate";
- from 0 to 2 points (out of 110) for assessment of the "educational activities not expressed in a mark out of 30 and for all the other relevant elements in the student's academic career".

With reference to the "GPA"it should be noted that:

- a mark of 30 "cum laude"is expressed as 31;
- a maximum of 2 additional exams are taken into consideration (in cases where students have passed more than 2 additional exams, their 2 best results will be used);
- if students have passed exams at other Italian or foreign universities with a mark that is not expressed out of 30, the mark is converted to a mark out of 30 on the basis of a specific conversion table.

With reference to the "quality of the final paper":

- 4 points (out of 110) are awarded for excellent work;
- 3-2 points (out of 110) for good work;
- 1-0 points (out of 110) for sufficient work (final papers that are judged to be insufficient cannot be presented).

Based on the points proposed by the tutor, the Board assesses the quality of the final paper.

With reference to the "time taken to graduate".

- 2 points (out of 110) are awarded for degrees obtained within the standard program duration; more specifically by the last graduation session of the third year of the program;
- 1 point (out of 110) is awarded for degrees obtained not more than 1 year after the standard program duration;
- **0** points (out of 110) are awarded for degrees obtained more than 1 year after the normal standard program duration.

With reference to "educational activities not expressed in a mark out of 30 and for all the other elements in the student's academic career", a maximum of 2 points can be awarded in the following way:

- 1 point (out of 110) for:
 - participation in the International Exchange Program (if student received credit for one exam passed abroad);
 - participation in an internship or a similar program, in Italy or abroad, that lasted at least 3 months.
- **0.5** points (out of 110) for:

- participation in the Free-Mover Semester Program (if student received credit for at least one exam passed abroad);

- Computer skills certificate of a higher level than the level foreseen by the program requirements, namely the complete ECDL;

- an international foreign language certification of a higher level than the exit level foreseen by the program requirements, which is recognized by the University (see 3.3.4: "International certifications") and which must be approved by the Language Centre;

- positive participation, attested to by the teacher, for foreign language and cultural courses (e.g. Arab, Chinese, etc; see paragraph 3.8.1);

- internships or similar activities in Italy or abroad that lasted between 2 to 3 months.

• 0.25 points (out of 110) for:

- participation in the Campus Abroad Program (if student received credit for one exam passed abroad see paragraph 3.5.2);

- positive participation in a library research course (organized by the <u>University Library</u>; see paragraph 3.8.1);

- active participation in a course organized by CESDIA, from among those declared valid at

the start of the academic year (see paragraph 3.8.1);

- active participation in a Sapere a tutto campo interdisciplinary course, from among those declared valid at the start of the academic year (see paragraph 3.8.1);

- active participation in the In-Company Training Program organized by the Career Service (see paragraph 3.7).

With reference to "educational activities not expressed in a mark out of 30 and for all the other elements in the student's academic career":

• 2 points may be cumulated by adding together the activities of different subsections.

It is not possible to add together points for activities which form part of the same subsection 2 or more times. For example:

- it is possible to obtain 0.5 points (out of 110) for a foreign language course and another 0.5 points (out of 110) for an internship that lasted less than 3 months;
- it is possible to attend different foreign language and cultural courses, however only 0.5 points (out of 110) will be awarded;
- internships can only be considered once, even if they are undertaken in different subsections.

The minimum graduation grade is 66 and the maximum grade is 110. The Board calculates the rounding of the graduation grade; if the decimal point is equal to or higher than 5, then the graduation grade is rounded up, whereas if the decimal point is lower than 5 it is rounded down.

The Examining Board **may** unanimously award "lode" (cum laude) **only** if the total of the 4 elements used to calculate the graduation grade is greater than or equal to 111.

6.2.6. Results released

This list will be posted on the bulletin board located on the ground floor of the University building at via Sarfatti 25. Graduates also receive a personalized notification of their graduation grade and information about the

In general, from the **first** working day following the publication of graduation results, graduates can print the graduation certifications which are described in chapter 8 at Punto Blu terminals (they'll need their Bocconi ID card).

6.2.8. Graduation ceremonies

The graduation ceremonies are generally organized according to undergraduate degree and are led by the Program Director or his/her delegate in the presence of the graduates and their families and friends. At the ceremony graduates are awarded their degree diplomas.

If the graduate is unable to attend the ceremony, the degree diploma will be sent to the mailing address provided when making the graduation reservation.

The <u>Graduation Calendar</u> can be consulted on the website in the section dedicated to <u>graduations</u> (http://www.unibocconi.it/graduationcalendar).

7.1. Continuing studies

7.1.1. Rules for sitting exams

Students are admitted to the following year of studies regardless of the number of credit points gained, however:

- they cannot sit second-year exams if they have not yet gained 60% of the credit points for the first year;
- they cannot sit third-year exams if they have not passed all the exams for the first year and if they have not gained 60% of the credit points for the second year.

Checks are carried out at the end of every exam period to ensure that these requirements have been fulfilled.

Any exams that have been passed, which are not in compliance with the above-mentioned rules, will be automatically annulled and will have to be repeated.

These rules are valid until up to and including the November 2007 exam period.

Starting from the first exam session following the end of first-semester lessons of the 2007-2008 academic year, i.e. from January 2008, rules of bachelor program starting from 2006-2007 academic year will apply.

In particular:

"students enrolled in the first year of studies are admitted to the second year only if they have earned at least 24 credit points within the period of exams of July 2008."

Please notice that there are no restrictions for enrolment after the second year.

Students who are regularly enrolled in the academic year as regular ("in corso") or repeating ("ripetente"):

- are allocated a class group for lessons;
- are allowed to attend any repeat class groups for courses which have not been passed;
- are allowed to sit partial and general exams;
- are granted access to the various services offered by the University (Library, IT rooms, etc);
- can obtain enrolment certifications for the academic year in which they are enrolled.

After the first enrolment in the third year of studies, students who have not yet completed their studies must enrol as a repeating student ("fuori corso").

Students enrolled as "fuori corso" are not assigned class groups for learning activities.

7.1.2. Administrative procedures and deadlines for enrolment third year

Enrolment must be carried out during the **1 August - 10 September 2007** period via Punto Blu or Virtual Punto Blu.

The enrolment procedures are as follows:

- select the "Enrolment in Academic Year" option from the main menu at any Punto Blu terminal or Virtual Punto Blu;
- enter the requested enrolment data.

At this stage the system automatically asks students to choose electives and foreign language modules; students enrolled in the Undergraduate Degree in Scienze giuridiche [Law] (CLSG) may add

a second foreign language to their study plans in lieu of "projects/seminars" (see chapter 7.1.4).

The system will then ask you to confirm your enrolment in the academic year, choice of foreign language modules and elective courses.

Once enrolment has been completed, students can immediately print the following from Punto Blu:

- the "enrolment" and "official academic transcript" certifications;
- personalized class timetable;
- personalized exam timetable.

Enrolment in the academic year is completed once the first instalment of the university fees and tuition has been paid and recorded in the student's academic career. If the first instalment of the university fees and tuition is not paid by 14 September 2007 students will not be able to carry out any administrative or learning activities or make use of any student services.

Students who do not enrol by 10 September 2007, for whatever reason, can enrol during the **17 September - 31 December 2007**(*) period upon payment of a late-enrolment fee (for detailed information consult the website at <u>http://www.unibocconi.it/fees</u>) and with the understanding that the number of electives to choose from may be reduced (see following paragraphs).

After **31 December 2007** enrolment is only possible:

- as a repeating student ("fuori corso") for students enrolled in the third year or as repeating students ("fuori corso") in the previous academic year;
- in the third year for students already enrolled in the second year or second-year repeating students ("ripetente") in the previous academic year upon the Rector's acceptance of a written justification and request for an extension. The request must be submitted to the Teaching Services and Organization Desk together with payment of the penalty fees (more information is on the website at http://www.unibocconi.it/fees).

(*) Since 31 December 2007 is a holiday, the deadline is extended to the next working day (2 January 2008).

7.1.3. Choice of foreign language modules

Students must choose the foreign languages and modules they wish to attend during the first and second semester, when they enrol in the third year of studies (1 August - 10 September 2007).

Students can change their first and/or second language via Punto Blu or Virtual Punto Blu from 7 to 31 January 2008.

7.1.4. Choice of a second foreign language for law students

Students enrolled in the Undergraduate Degree in Scienze giuridiche [Law] (CLSG) can include a second foreign language in their study plans instead of "projects/seminars". In order to add a second language to their study plans, students must submit an application via Punto Blu or Virtual Punto Blu when completing enrolment between 1 August - 10 September 2007.

7.1.5. Choice of elective courses

When students enrol in the third year of their programs (1 August - 10 September 2007) they must choose their elective courses for both the first and second semesters, for inclusion in their study plan. During this period students can also change the electives they chose when enrolling in the current academic year.

Before choosing electives, students are advised to check the list of courses available, course profiles, class timetables and the list of incompatible and banned courses published on the specific sections of the website.

For all courses both restricted groups and broad groups students must choose an alternative to their first choice.

Students in all undergraduate degree programs must choose 4 electives, except for DIEM students who must choose 8.

As explained below, the second choice is necessary in case the first-choice elective does not attract the minimum number of students (15), or the maximum number of students (120) has already been reached.

The educational offer for the 2007-2008 academic year include an e-learning class group already taught in the same semester using traditional methods.

If required, when students are asked to choose their elective courses, they must specify the learning method (either traditional or e-learning).

Starting up e-learning class groups depends on:

- activating the traditional class group (if this does not happen, the e-learning class group will not be activated);
- a minimum number of inscriptions has to be reached.

By 17 September 2007:

- allocation of first- and second-semester electives will take place;
- students will receive a personal message in their <u>voU@B</u> student diaries informing them of whether they have been assigned the chosen electives or not.

Allocation of courses is based on a scale that takes into account the alternatives expressed by students and their positions in the elective enrolment list when they made the choice/change. Students who change only one elective course lose the priority position they held for their initial choice, even for elective courses which have not been changed.

Courses that do not attract the minimum number of 15 students will not be run unless the courses are taught in English.

Courses must not have more than 120 students. The following students are not included in the limit of 120:

- students participating in international programs from foreign universities;
- students who opt to change from a four-year to a three-year program, since the results of their applications will be released by 1 October 2007;
- students who already hold a degree from Università Bocconi and are admitted to the third year.

Bocconi students participating in international programs may have exams recorded in their academic career which were taken at universities abroad that correspond to Bocconi courses that have either not reached the minimum number of students and therefore are not run or that have already reached the maximum number of students.

During the 17-28 September 2007 period:

- students who were not allocated either their first-choice electives or their second-choice electives and
- students who obtained permission to change their undergraduate degree programs

must choose from among the first- and second-semester electives that are still available, at Punto Blu or <u>Virtual Punto Blu</u>. In this phase, once electives have reached the maximum number of 120 students, they will no longer be available for other students to choose.

Students who enrol in the academic year after 10 September, and especially during the period from 10 September 2007 to 31 December 2007(**), can choose their first- and second-semester electives from the list of electives that are still available at the time of enrolment in the academic year.

(**) Since 31 December 2007 is a holiday, the deadline is extended to the next working day (2 January 2008).

7.1.6. Changing first and second semester elective courses with second semester elective courses

During the 7-31 January 2008 period students can change the first- and second-semester electives included in their study plans with other second-semester electives, as long as they refer to the current academic year.

Changing electives is always subject to the limited numbers as described in paragraph 7.1.5.

7.1.7. Additional courses

Additional courses are those that, if included in the study plan, provide more than the 180 credit points needed to fulfil the degree requirements. They can be chosen from among the range of elective courses and can only be included in the study plan after students have passed all the course exams of the first 3 semesters of their undergraduate degree programs.

A maximum of 2 additional exams can be included in the calculation of the Grade Point Average (the best 2 marks).

Students can choose additional courses starting with their third year by filling out a form that can be collected from the Teaching Services and Organization Desk during the 1 August 2007 - 31 January 2008 period.

Additional courses can be cancelled by handing in an application to the Teaching Services and Organization Desk.

7.2. Changing undergraduate degree program

7.2.1. Rules After completion of the first year, students may change their program of study.

- Changing undergraduate degree program at the end of the first year: Students may sit the exams for the second year of the degree program they want to change to, only if they have gained 60% of the credit points for the first year for either their original degree program or their new degree program.
- Changing undergraduate degree program at the end of the second year: students can sit the exams for the third year of the program they want to change to only if they have gained all the required credit points of the first year of the degree program they want to change to, and at least 60% of the credit points for the second year for either their original degree program or their new degree program.
- Changing undergraduate degree program at the end of the third year: The Program Director will decide the year into which the student will be admitted after evaluating all credit points gained .

For undergraduate degree programs that are taught in both Italian and English, changing from a class group taught in English to a class group taught in Italian (and vice versa) is considered to be a change in degree programs, and therefore can only be done at the end of the year.

There are no numerical restrictions for students who want to change from one degree program to another.

When changing from one undergraduate degree program to another, the following applies:

- exams taken for courses in the original degree program that have the same title, code and credit point value as those included in the new degree program are considered to be **'equal'**;
- exams are 'to be integrated' if they are exams for courses belonging to the same subject group in both the original and new degree programs. Courses may have significantly different course profiles even if they are worth the same credit point value, or the original programs course may be worth less credit points than those of the new program. In this case the exam mark is based on a weighted average of the marks obtained in both degree programs;
- any exams included in the original degree program that are not included in the program structure of the new degree program are considered to be **'in excess'**.

In addition, students are considered to have attended the lessons for courses taken in the years before the change included in the program structure of the new degree program. This means that students can register for the exams of courses included in the program structure of the new degree program, starting with the November exam period.

Students can submit an application to change undergraduate degree program (the application form must be collected, filled out and handed in at the Teaching Services and Organization Desk) during the 1 August - 3 September 2007 period. The same deadline applies for cancelling or modifying any applications previously submitted.

In order to submit the application to change undergraduate degree program, students must be already enrolled in the **third year** of their **original** degree programs for the 2007-2008 a.y.

On 11 September 2007, via their yoU@B student diaries, students will receive the results of the application for degree program change together with a copy of the new degree program details and the class group assigned. The list of the results is also available on University bulleting boards (University building, via Sarfatti 25).

7.3. Transferring to another degree system

7.3.1. Rules

Transferring to another degree system is defined as changing from a three-year undergraduate degree program, which remained active until the 2005-2006 academic year, to a bachelor program which was activated starting with the 2006-2007 a.y..

Transferring to another degree system forsees:

- admission to the **first year**, if less than 24 credit points required in the study plan of the new degree program are recognized;
- admission to the **second year**, if the number of credit points recognized is higher or equal to 24 and less than 90, as required in the study plan of the new degree program;
- admission to the **third year**, (starting with the 2008-2009 academic year) if at least 90 credit points are recognized, as required in the study plan of the new degree program.

In addition:

- there are no numerical limits for students who wish to transfer to another degree system;
- exams which have been passed in the original degree program, but are required in the study plan of the new degree program in years following the admission year, will be registered in the students academic career in due time (at the beginning of the year of studies in which they are required);

• students may only be admitted to a year of studies which is active (for the 2007-2008 a.y. only the first and second years are running).

When changing from one undergraduate degree program to another, the following applies:

- exams taken for courses in the original degree program that have the same title, code and credit point value as those included in the new degree program are considered to be **'equal'**;
- exams are 'to be integrated' if they are exams for courses belonging to the same subject group in both the original and new degree programs. Courses may have significantly different course profiles even if they are worth the same credit point value, or the original program's course may be worth less credit points than those of the new program. In this case the exam mark is based on a weighted average of the marks obtained in both degree programs;
- any exams included in the original degree program that are not included in the program structure of the new degree program are considered to be **'in excess'**.

In addition, students are considered to have attended the lessons for the courses taken in the years before the change included in the program structure of the new degree program. This means that students can register for the exams of these courses, starting with the November exam period. Last change 31/07/2007 14:29

7.3.2. Procedures and administrative deadlines

In order to submit an application to transfer to another degree system, students must be enrolled in the **third year** of the 2007-2008 a.y. in their **original** degree programs.

Students can submit the application to change undergraduate program (the application form can be collected and handed in at the Teaching Services and Organization Desk) during the 1 August - 3 September 2007 period. The same deadline applies for cancelling or modifying any applications which were previously submitted. Changing to a (three-year) bachelor program which starts with the 2006-2007 a.y. is **irreversible.**

A special Committee composed of a Professor (Degree Program Director or a delegate) and a representative of the Student Administration Centre opens the dossier and determines the year of admission, recognition of exams and "study plan to be completed".

By October 2007, via their yoU@B student diaries, students will receive the results of the degree system transfer together with the new program details and the class group assigned. The list of the results is also available on University bulleting boards (University building, via Sarfatti 25).

7.4.1. Rules

The Ministerial Decree of 25 November 2005 defines the Combined Bachelor and Master of Science in Giurisprudenza [Law] (CLMG) as a five-year path, aimed at professional competencies in law.

Students who enrolled in the Undergraduate Degree in Scienze giuridiche [Law] (CLSG) for the 2005-2006 a.y. or in previous years, may continue the undergraduate degree program and finish the educational path with the Master of Science in Giurisprudenza [Law] (CLG-LS) which will remain active until completed, or transfer to the five-year Combined Bachelor and Master of Science program with recovery of debits.

The following describes the administrative criteria for Bocconi students and students from other universities who, enrolled in an undergraduate degree program in Law (field of study 31) or in a Master of Science program in Law (field of study 22/S), wish to be admitted to the five-year Combined Bachelor and Master of Science program.

The option to change to the five-year system includes:

- admission to the first year, if less than 24 credit points required in the first years study plan of the Combined Bachelor and Master of Science program are recognized;
- admission to the second year, if the number of credit points recognized is higher or equal to 24 and less than 90 as required in the first- and second-year study plan of the Combined Bachelor and Master of Science program;
- admission to the third year, (starting with the 2008-2009 a.y.) if the number of credit points recognized is > 90 as required in the first- and second-year study plan of the Combined Bachelor and Master of Science program;
- admission to the first, second, and third year of the five-year program for students who already have an undergraduate degree.

In addition:

- students who opt for the change may only be admitted to an active year of studies;
- students who opt for the change extend the duration of their studies for at least one year
- students who opt for the change can sit exams for courses in the new degree program study plan in years previous to the student's admission, starting with the first available exam session and without having attended lessons;
- exams which have been passed in the original degree program but are required by the new degree program study plan for courses in years previous to the student's admission, are registered in the student's academic career in due time (at the beginning of the year in which they are required);
- for Bocconi students, there is no limit to the number of exams and credits which are recognized.

- students enrolled in the Undergraduate Degree in Scienze giuridiche [Law] (CLSG) or in the Master of Science in Giurisprudenza [Law] (CLG-LS) may exercise this option in any year of studies;
- students who exercise this option add at least 1 year more to the standard duration of studies;
- changing to the five-year system is irreversible.

The following table shows the development of the five-year system's progressive activation and the progressive deactivation of the three-year and two-year systems:

Therefore, please note that:

- for the 2006-2007 academic year, students could only be admitted to the first year of the Combined Bachelor and Master of Science program;
- for the 2007-2008 academic year, students may only be admitted to the first or second year of the Combined Bachelor and Master of Science program;
- for the 2008-2009 academic year and those following, students may be admitted to the first, second or third year of the Combined Bachelor and Master of Science program;
- students enrolled in the Undergraduate Degree in Scienze giuridiche [Law] (CLSG) (Program's field of study 31) or in the Master of Science in Giurisprudenza [Law] (CLG-LS) (22/S) should keep in mind that first-year courses of the Master of Science program class group 22/S will be active only up to the 2008-2009 a.y.

7.4.2. Numerical limits to options

For the 2007-2008 a.y., the following numerical limits to options have been set:

• 10 students for the first year;

• 20 students for the second year.

If the number of applications is greater than the number of places, a ranking list will be determined based on the number of credit points gained and the GPA of exams passed by July 2007.

7.4.3. Procedures and administrative deadlines

A specific committee comprised of a professor (the CLMG Program Director or a delegate) and a representative of the Student Administration Centre verifies the student's admissibility according to the numerical limits, decides on the year of studies in which the student shall be admitted, recognizes exams and determines the "study plan to be completed".

This option may be exercised at the start of every academic year.

For the 2007-2008 a.y., applications for changing to the five-year system must be submitted during the period from 1 August to 3 September 2007.

The options procedure includes the following steps:

- after students have enrolled in the current academic year they must fill out an application which can be collected and submitted to the Teaching Services and Organization Desk; at this time students may also renounce any applications which they have previously submitted;
- the commission opens the dossier;
- application results will be published by 1 October 2007 and students will be contacted by phone or email;
- as a general guide, students have 5 days to go to the Student Administration Centre to check their study plans;
- as a general guide, students have 5 days to decide in writing whether they accept the change or not; if students do not provide a written declaration, the request for change is revoked; changing to the five-year system is irreversible.

7.5. Transferring to another university

Università Bocconi students can transfer to another university by collecting, filling out and submitting an application to the Teaching Services and Organization Desk; they must include details of the University they intend to transfer to, the Faculty and the degree program.

Students are advised to find out when the deadline for receiving transfer documents is from the

University they intend to transfer to, in order to ensure that they have enough time to complete the transfer procedure.

Students who submit a transfer request during the 1 August - 28 September 2007 period do not have to enrol in the 2007-2008 a.y., while students who submit a transfer request after 1 October 2007 (and in any case before 31 December 2007(*)) must enrol in the 2007-2008 a.y.

Enrolled students who have submitted a transfer request should contact the University Fees Office (TCA) for information regarding university fees and tuition.

The transfer application must be accompanied by:

- the unofficial academic transcript and Bocconi ID card;
- receipt for payment of fees for the issue of the transfer document;
- declaration from the Università Bocconi Library that the student does not have any books still out on loan;
- authorization from ISU;
- authorization from the University Fees Office (TCA).

Students who transfer to another university cannot return to Università Bocconi before one year from the date of the transfer document.

In such cases, students are admitted to the year of studies they have the right to, on the basis of exams passed and approved, regardless of the year of studies the students were previously enrolled in.

Students who intend to continue their studies at the Italian Military Academy or at universities abroad must complete the special application form available from the Teaching Services and Organization Desk.

(*) Since 31 December 2007 is a holiday, the deadline is extended to the next working day (2 January 2008).

7.6. Suspension and resumption of university studies

- Suspension
- Temporary interruption

Students are suspended if they have not gained any credit points for a period of time equal to the standard program duration.

The suspension takes into account the academic years in which students:

- are enrolled but do not earn credits;
- do not enrol.

The years mentioned above are calculated in determining disqualification as well (see paragraph 7.6). Students who intend to resume their studies after being suspended must submit a written formal reinstatement request. The validity of any previously gained credit points and the year of studies in which students must enrol will be evaluated.

The suspension will result in students being unable to carry out any administrative or educational activities or make use of any university services.

Students who resume studies must consult the University Fees Office (TCA) regarding university fees and tuition.

If, after reinstatement, students do not earn any credit points during their first year of the program, they will be suspended once again for the following years until disqualification.

7.6.2. Temporary interruption

Students who during the academic year are involved with military service and civil service duties, female students in the year of birth of each child and students who are forced to interrupt studies because of serious illness and certified prolonged medical conditions can apply to temporarily interrupt their studies in accordance with D.P.C.M. 09/04/2001.

Temporary interruption of studies means that students will not be able to complete any administrative operations, participate in educational activities or make use of university services. The years for which the student did not enrol do not count towards disqualification. For each year of temporary interruption students are required to pay a fixed sum for each year as set by the University Fees Office (TCA).

7.7. Disqualification • after a maximum number of 4 years enrolled as repeating students ("fuori corso" and/or "ripetenti"),

or

• if students have gained no credit points after 6 years (i.e., equal to double the program standard duration).

When calculating the maximum number of years enrolled as repeating students ("fuori corso" and/or "ripetente"), the period in which there was a temporary interruption of studies in accordance with D.P.C.M. 09/04/2001 (military service, civil service, year of childbirth, serious illness and certified prolonged medical conditions) is not included.

Students who have been disqualified from their degree programs can obtain certifications attesting to their university career and the number of credit points gained. If students should eventually resume their studies, the credit points previously gained will be evaluated to determine if they are still valid.

Disqualification does not apply to those students who have passed all exams and only miss the final degree exam .

7.8. Withdrawing from university studies

Students who do not intend to exercise the rights they acquired by enrolling can withdraw from their studies at any time. Withdrawal requests must be written in a clear, concise form, and are irrevocable.

Students who withdraw may obtain certifications attesting to their university career and credit points gained .

The withdrawal application form must be collected, filled out and submitted to the Teaching Services and Organization Desk. In their applications students must declare that they have no pending obligations with ISU Bocconi, the Bocconi Library or other University Offices. The student ID must be attached to the application.

Enrolled students who present a withdrawal application must check with the University Fees Office (TCA) regarding university fees and tuition due.

8.1. Certifications

Students can request the following certifications/documents:

- enrolment in academic year, that is also valid for applying for child benefits;
- official academic transcript, comprising the educational activities taken including mark if appropriate;
- unofficial academic transcript;
- financial aid, containing a declaration of exemption from University tuition and fees;
- University tuition and fees paid by students in the previous academic year.

Students can print all certifications/documents at Punto Blu terminals using their ID card (see chapter 1) providing that they have paid their University tuition and fees and are correctly enrolled in the current academic year.

Students who do not enroll in the current academic year (2007-2008) will receive, from 11 September 2007 to 2 January 2008, a certification attesting the student's enrolment in the previous academic year, i.e. "he/she was enrolled in the 2006-2007 a.y. in...".

The same certification if requested after 2 January 2008 will contain, in addition to the sentence above, also a phrase attesting that the student did not renew his enrolment, i.e. "after that year the student did not renew his enrolment at this University".

Graduates can request the following certificates:

- degree, comprising the conferral date and graduation grade;
- official graduate academic transcript, that specifies the conferral date, graduation grade, a list of educational activities pursued including marks if appropriate;
- diploma supplement (see next paragraph);
- resumption of university studies, valid for the resumption of university years for pension purposes.

It is also possible to print certifications for undergraduate studies at Punto Blu terminals as long as the Bocconi ID card is still valid. If not, **graduates can request** them at the Teaching Services and Organization Desk.

Students/Graduates who cannot go in person to the Teaching Services and Organization Desk can empower, by **written authorization**, another person to request or pick up the certifications. The written authorization must contain:

- name and surname (family name) of the student;
- personal details;
- personal details of the authorized person;

- type of certification requested ,number of copies and the language in which you want the certification (Italian or English);
- signature of the student;
- a photocopy of the student's entire identity card, or other document

The authorized person must go to the Teaching Services and Organization Desk with the documents mentioned above and also with their own identity card or similar proof of identity document (e.g. passport).

Students/Graduates can also **request any of the certifications via fax** to the number 02 5836.2041. Students must fax the signed request specifying their name and surname (family name), student ID and a contact number, type of certification required, number of copies attaching a complete copy of their identity card or other identity document.

The certifications requested will be sent by post to the address specified on the request.

8.2. Diploma supplement

The diploma supplement is an official document that is issued on completion of a university or higher education institute qualification and conforms to the European template developed by the European Commission, the Council of Europe and UNESCO - CEPES.

In accordance with the norms the diploma supplement is issued in a bilingual version (Italian and English).

The diploma supplement aims to make the student's qualification more "transparent" by providing additional information regarding the course of studies carried out. Thus making it easier for potential employers to evaluate new academic titles, furthermore simplifying the academic and professional recognition of Italian higher education qualifications abroad and the freedom of movement of graduate students.

The document that contains only official data about the student's academic career and it does not contain any value-judgments, equivalence statements or suggestions about recognition but describes the nature, level, context, contents and status of the studies carried out and completed by the student.

It is divided into 8 sections that contain the following information:

• personal details of the student;

- qualification awarded (e.g. Bachelor in xxx, field of study yyy; name of institution that issued the qualification, address of university, etc);
- level of qualification (e.g. first cycle of university studies, program duration and admission requirements);
- curriculum and exam marks and graduation grade with details of marking scale used;
- function of qualification (access to further study, professional status conferred by qualification);
- additional information (relevant elements in the student's curriculum, such as internships, study periods abroad, etc);
- national higher education system in Italy.

10.5. OTHER COSTS

Contributions for enrolment in final exams and fees for administrative services

Starting with August 1, 2007, contributions for enrolment in final exams and fees for administrative services are defined as follows:

Final exams

Final exams for undergraduate degree programs (3 years): 200 *covers:* expenses to print degree diploma, graduation ceremony and its recording on DVD, various state taxes; to be paid at least one month before registering for graduation.

Administrative services

- for each university transfer application: € 26
- for each duplicate or replacement of Bocconi ID card: € 26 (service is free if card has demagnetized)
- or each duplicate of original degree diploma: € 100
- for each additional copy of the diploma supplement (3-year undergraduate/bachelor degrees): € 20

It should be noted that for each certificate and/or authenticated copy on legal paper, the excise tax due (imposta di bollo) is to be paid by the student in the full amount due at the time of the certificate's request.
