PLOT

Past Simple or Past Continuous

Examples:

Yesterday I met an old friend (past action, past time).

While I was working (action in progress at a past moment), the bell rang (past action, past time).

Tom came in, took off his hat, and sat down (past narrative, sequence of actions).

Every day he came to see me (habit in the past).

While Mary was playing, Tom was singing (two actions of parallel duration shown by two continuous tenses).

I was going to speak (= was about to speak or intended to speak) when Tom got up.
